2022 Balance of State CoC Special NOFO Process

- HUD released the Supplemental Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) to address unsheltered and rural homelessness on June 22, 2022
- The Standards, Rating & Project Review Committee (on 8/5/22) established and the Balance of State CoC Board (on 8/9/22) approved:

 - Collaborative Applicant staff is actively working to secure written commitments of both housing and healthcare. Applicants that make it into the final ranking may be given access to these resources as they are available and applicable.

Racial Equity

- Scoring on project identification of barriers and steps taken/will take to eliminate barriers
- *HUD is emphasizing system and program changes to address equity within CoCs through identifying and addressing needs of those who are disproportionally more likely to experience homelessness

Lived Experience

- Will meet with the Youth Action Board to review project scoring criteria
- *HUD has expectation for CoCs to involve individuals with Lived Experience in service delivery and decision making

6. Use a Housing First Approach

- Projects funded required to follow a Housing First Approach
- Points for the degree that projects demonstrate project will operate under HF Model. Applicants passing threshold should demonstrate project is:
 - Low-barrier
 - Prioritizes rapid placement & stabilization in permanent housing
 - No service participation requirements
 - No preconditions to entry
- Points for the degree that projects demonstrate lowbarrier approach in application

HUD Funding Process – Special NOFO

HUD Funding Process – Two processes to select projects in Special NOFO:

- Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside
 - HUD will select CoCs based on CoC score
 - Highest scoring CoC will have projects that pass thresholds conditionally selected for funding
 - □ HUD will select projects in this manner until no funding remains
- Rural Homelessness Set Aside
 - Rural projects re-scored by HUD
 - CoC score up to 50 points
 - CoC Project Ranking up to 40 points
 - Serving Structurally Disadvantaged Areas up to 10 points
 - Projects included will be selected in order based on project application scores

BoS CoC Special NOFO Eligible Project Applicants

Eligible Project Applicants include (Special NOFO page 19):

- States
- Local Governments

- Public Housing Agencies (as defined in 24 CFR 5.100), are eligible without limitation or exclusion

BoS CoC Special NOFO Eligible Projects

Eligible Project Types (Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside and Rural Homelessness Set Aside*):

- Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)
- □ Rapid Rehousing (RRH)
- □ Joint TH and PH-RRH Component projects

*Applicants must determine which funding source that are requesting within both applications

*If Rural Set Aside funding requests exceed funding availability, CoC will consider new projects that pass eligibility and quality threshold under Unsheltered Set Aside as funding allows

BoS CoC Special NOFO Eligible Projects

Acquisition, New Construction, and Rehabilitation:

- Unsheltered Set Aside development activities Not Eligible
- Rural Set Aside development activities Allowed (PSH only)
 - □ \$11.5 million available
 - Proposing to Allow as follows:
 - Project limit up to ten (10) units at any one site
 - Dollar to dollar match for capital costs (leveraging)
 - PSH development projects scored on PSH program design
 - Additional capacity review for development activities
 - □ CoC requirement:
 - CoC Letter of Support of development activities with details about ho project will comply with Section 3

BoS CoC Special NOFO Ranking Priorities

CoC is required to competitively rank ALL Project Applications

Special NOFO Ranking Priorities

- Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside
 - New PSH, RRH, Joint TH & TH-RRH Component, and SSO projects (based on score)
 - New CoC Planning and HMIS projects
 - New projects that met eligibility/quality threshold originally submitted as Rural Set Aside project, but did not score well enough to be included in maximum amount allocated to CoC (if eligible)
- Rural Homelessness Set Aside
 - Rank based on score provided:
 - Project meets feasibility, eligibility, and threshold
 - Inclusion of project aligns with funding available
 - Development projects must demonstrate capacity to execute development activities and implement the project within allotted time frame

BoS CoC Special NOFO

- Applicants will need to submit a proposal outline ("notice of intent") that will indicate their intention to apply for a new project under Special NOFO
- No late applications will be accepted
- Review Applications will be sent for review by a review team subcommittee
- Applicants will also need to submit the HUD e-snaps application
- HUD Special NOFO Grant Terms:
 - Projects awarded funds for development activities 3-5 years
 - Up to 2 years to complete development activities
 - Remaining 3 years to serve program participants
 - All other projects 3 years

Additional BoS CoC Special NOFO Priorities and Policies (continued)

All applications must pass a threshold review to move forward to the scoring portion.
 Threshold factors include:

- Organizational and financial capacity
- Ineligible populations, activities, location, costs, etc.
- Past performance or compliance issues (if applicable)
- Lack of match or leverage dollars
- Use of HMIS (or HMIS compatible system, if a DV provider)
- Incomplete or late application
- Application outside of Balance of State's 152 counties
- New Projects must provide a plan to coordinate mainstream resources
- Project does not demonstrate cost effectiveness or adequate impact
- Applicants must demonstrate project will meet key federal requirements, fair housing, equal access, etc.
- Applicants must comply with following Written Standards, VAWA Policy, and utilizing Coordinated Entry System (New projects must commit to following policies)

Additional BoS CoC NOFO Priorities and Policies (continued)

Threshold Factors for Rural Homelessness Set Aside Applications:

- To be considered by HUD:
 - Must serve 100 percent rural areas as described in Section III.C.2.k
 - Must be ranked on the CoC Rural Set Aside project listing
 - Projects not meeting this requirement will not be considered under this selection process in Sections II.B.2 and VIII.A of the HUD NOFO.
- Listing of Georgia BoS CoC counties defined as "Rural" in this NOFO (Section III.C.2.k and Appendix B at:

https://www.hud.gov/program_offices/comm_planning/coc/specialCoCNOF O/supplemental).

• Generally, project applicants will need to select the funding type for which they are applying. However, project applications submitted requesting Rural Homeless Set Aside funding where the coverage area or project location includes one or more counties not included on Appendix B, will be reviewed as a request for Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside funding. As such, it will be required to meet eligibility requirements of the Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside funding.

2022 BoS CoC Special NOFO Competition

The application process is a two-step process

- Review Application and all required documents for New project ranking
 - Emailed to DCA (with <u>all required attachments</u>)
 - Application Packages due no later than 3:00pm, August 29, 2022
 - Applications will be scored and ranked by an application review subcommittee
- □ HUD Application in *E-SNAPS*
 - This is required for ALL project applications
 - Must be complete, with all required attachments, no later than 5:00pm, September 14, 2022

Program and Project Applications

HUD New Project Criteria

New Project Criteria:

- □ Project Applicant in good standing with HUD, DCA, or other
- Demonstrate the financial and management capacity and experience to carry out the project and experience to administer federal funds
- Applicant, subrecipient, project, and participant eligibility
- Demonstrate connection to mainstream service systems
- Participate/agree to participate in CoC's Coordinated Assessment System & HMIS (or comparable database)
- Must administer programs or activities in the most integrated setting appropriate to the needs of qualified homeless with disabilities

Permanent Supportive Housing Participant Eligibility

- Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH^{*}) projects funded through the 2022 Special NOFO must have the following eligibility criteria for program participants:
 - Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside
 - Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - Category 4 Victim of DV, meeting category 1
 - Rural Homelessness Set Aside (limited to serve counties defined as Rural in NOFO)
 - Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - Category 2 imminent risk of homelessness
 - Category 4 victim of DV, meeting category 1
- PSH Projects must serve people meeting the eligibility criteria for people with a disability as defined by HUD.

PSH Project Applications - HUD Project Quality Threshold

- Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) projects funded through the 2022 Special NOFO must have the following eligibility criteria for program participants:
 - Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside
 - Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - Category 4 Victim of DV, meeting category 1
 - Rural Homelessness Set Aside (limited to serve counties defined as Rural in NOFO)
 - Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - Category 2 imminent risk of homelessness
 - Category 4 victim of DV, meeting category 1
- All projects must participate in coordinated entry
- All projects must operate consistently with CoC Plan for serving people experiencing homelessness with Severe Service Needs described in Special NOFO

RRH Project Application - HUD Project Quality Threshold

Rapid Rehousing projects must meet 4 of 5, and if awarded will be require to meet all criteria listed:

- Joint TH and PH-RRH Component (Joint TH-RRH Component) projects funded through the 2022 NOFO must have the following eligibility criteria for program participants:
 - Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside
 - Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - Category 4 Victim of DV, meeting category 1
 - Rural Homelessness Set Aside (limited to serve counties defined as Rural in NOFO)
 - Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - Category 2 imminent risk of homelessness
 - Category 4 victim of DV, meeting category 1
- All projects must participate in coordinated entry
- All projects must operate consistently with CoC Plan for serving people experiencing homelessness with Severe Service Needs described in Special NOFO

Joint TH & PH-RRH Component Project Application - HUD Project Quality Threshold

Joint TH and PH-RRH component projects must meet 4 of 6, and if awarded will be require to meet all criteria listed:

- Type of housing proposed must meet needs of participants
- Project will provide enough RRH assistance to ensure that at any time a participant may move from TH to RRH. This can be demonstrated by a RRH budget with twice the funding over TH, twice as many RRH units over TH, or by demonstrating the budget and units are appropriate for the population served (1 point)
- Type of supportive services offered will ensure successful retention in or help to obtain permanent housing (1 point)
- Project has a specific plan for ensuring program participants will be individually assisted to obtain the benefits of mainstream health, social, and employment programs for which they are eligible to apply and which meet the needs of program participants (1 point)
- Program participants are assisted to obtain and remain in permanent housing in a manner that fits their needs (e.g., provides the participant with some type of transportation to access needed services, safety planning, case management, housing that meets accessibility related needs, additional assistance to ensure retention of permanent housing) (1 point)
- The proposed project is consistent with the plan described by the CoC in response to Section VII.B.4 of this NOFO (1 point)

Joint TH & PH-RRH Component Project Application - HUD Threshold

□ Joint TH and PH-RRH Component Projects:

- □ Combines TH and RRH:
 - Recipients should prioritize those with the highest needs using an evidence-based approach designed to provide stable housing and services that, to the greatest extent possible, move the participant towards self-sufficiency and independence.
 - Not intended to replace transitional housing projects
- Threshold factors for Joint TH and PH-RRH component projects include:
 - Demonstrate project will follow a Low Barrier approach and prioritize rapid placement and stabilization in permanent housing
 - Demonstrate project will be able to provide both components to all participants
 - Use a Housing First approach with client-driven service models and focus on helping people move to permanent housing

Joint TH & PH-RRH Component Project Application - HUD Threshold (cont'd.)

- Incorporate client-choice.
- Target and prioritize people with higher needs and most vulnerable.
- □ Limit costs as follows:
 - Leasing and operating costs for TH portion only
 - Short- or Medium-term tenant-based rental assistance in RRH portion
 - Supportive services, HMIS, and Admin across entire project

 - Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside
 - Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - Category 4 Victim of DV, meeting category 1
 - Rural Homelessness Set Aside (limited to serve counties defined as Rural in NOFO)
 - Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - Category 2 imminent risk of homelessness
 - Category 4 victim of DV, meeting category 1
- All projects must participate in coordinated entry

SSO-SO and Standalone SSO Project Application - HUD Project Quality Threshold

- Program participants are assisted to obtain and maintain permanent housing in a manner that fits their needs. (1 point)
- Project has a specific plan for ensuring program participants will be individually assisted to obtain the benefits of mainstream health, social, and employment programs for which they are eligible to apply and which meet the needs of program participants. (1 point)
- □ The project proposed will participate in coordinated entry. (2 points)
- The proposed project is consistent with the plan described by the CoC in response to Section VII.B.4 of this NOFO. (1 point)

SSO-Coordinated Entry Project Application -HUD Project Quality Threshold

SSO-Coordinated Entry projects must meet 2 of 4, and if awarded will be require to meet all criteria listed:

- The centralized or coordinated assessment system is easily available/reachable for all persons within the CoC's geographic area who are seeking homeless assistance. The system must also be accessible for persons with disabilities within the CoC's geographic area. (1 point)
- There is a strategy for advertising that is designed specifically to reach homeless persons with the highest barriers within the CoC's geographic area. (1 point)
- □ There is a standardized assessment process. (1 point)
- Ensures program participants are directed to appropriate housing and services that fit their needs. (1 point)

Rural Set Aside Only - Additional Costs Allowed (pages 21-22)

- In general, for the Rural Set Aside, eligible activities are those identified in the CoC Program regulations at 24 CFR 578.37 through 578.63, and those listed in paragraph (b) when they are part of an SSO, PH, or Joint TH and PH:RRH Component project.
- Additionally, staff and overhead costs directly related to carrying out the eligible activities in paragraph (b) on page 21 are eligible as part of those activities.

(b) The eligible activities authorized under section 491 that are eligible under this Special NOFO are (when they are part of a SSO, PH, or Joint TH and PH:RRH Component project):

- (i) Rent or utility assistance after 2 months of nonpayment of rent or utilities to prevent eviction or loss of utility service. <u>Funds may be used</u> to pay rent or utility arrear payments up to 6 months on behalf of program participants residing in permanent housing.
- (i) Short-term emergency lodging in motels or shelters, either directly or through vouchers. <u>Eligible costs</u> <u>include</u> lodging costs in motels or hotels for program participants; pro-rata share of sheltering program participants in existing shelters so long as the costs are actual costs of creating new and temporary beds in emergency shelters and not to permanently increase the capacity of the shelter. No funds may be used to shelter program participants in existing shelter beds..
- (i) Repairs, (such as insulation, window repair, door repair, roof repair, and repairs) that are necessary to make housing habitable to be used for transitional or permanent housing by people experiencing homelessness. The total cost of repairs may not exceed \$10,000 per structure.

Rural Set Aside Only - Additional Costs Allowed (pages 21-22) (cont'd.)

Paragraph (b) continued: Eligible activities authorized under section 491 that are eligible under this Special NOFO are (**when they are part of a SSO, PH, or Joint TH and PH:RRH Component project**):

(iv) Capacity building activities. Capacity building activities <u>are those activities that maintain or</u> <u>improve the skills of recipients</u>. (see NOFO for eligible activities).

(v) Emergency food and clothing assistance. The <u>cost of providing meals or groceries and</u> <u>clothing to program participants</u> are eligible costs.

(viii) Costs associated with making use of Federal Inventory property programs to house homeless individuals and families. Federal Inventory property programs means the Use of Federal Real Property to Assist the Homeless program authorized by title V of the Act, and implemented by 24 CFR part 581, and the Single Family Property Disposition Program authorized by section 204(g) of the National Housing Act (12. U.S.C. 1710(g)) and implemented at 24 CFR part 291 (see NOFO for eligible costs)

Match and Leveraging Documentation

- All <u>New project Review Applications</u> are required to submit documentation dated January 1, 2022 or later, in order for the commitment to count for match or leverage.
- While match and leverage can be either cash or in-kind, please note that submitting only in-kind sources may call into question the strength and fiscal capacity to administer the project.
- Designated match and leveraging cannot be duplicated across applications.
- Review NOFO and HUD's New Project Detailed Instructions to determine what the match documentation requirements are for <u>e-snaps</u> applications.
- Note: If third-party match is listed in <u>e-snaps</u> application, a separate attachment screen will appear that should be used to attach MOU(s) documentation that confirms the in-kind match commitment.
- Leveraging should only be reported in the review application, and is not required in e-snaps

Match and Leveraging Requirements

- The recipient or subrecipient must match all grant funds, except for leasing funds, with no less than 25 percent of funds or in-kind contributions from other sources for eligible costs.
- Match must be for eligible activities within the same category
 - □ HMIS dollars are not eligible match for Supportive Service Costs
- Examples of Eligible Sources of Cash Match include:
 - Applicant/Project Sponsor's own cash
 - Federal government grants/contracts (excluding CoC funds)
 - State and local government grants/contracts
 - Private grants or contributions
 - □ Program Income (see NOFO)
- Examples of Eligible Sources of Non-cash Match include:
 - In-kind donations
 - Volunteer time
 - Donated services
 - Donated Property
- For the project application in E-Snaps, there are new questions concerning program income. Agencies should list type of match and source. FORMAL documentation required at technical submission and MAY be a required attachment.
- Review application are scored on amount of match and leveraging listed with a goal of 100% match & leveraging (for maximum points.)

Eligible Populations

Populations Served Through Continuum of Care

Homeless Individuals & Families

- Originally from the streets or emergency shelters (or as expanded by NOFO).
- Homeless Verification A household is homeless if <u>you can prove with adequate</u> <u>documentation</u>.
- Individuals and families served by new PSH, RRH, Joint TH and PH-RRH component, and SSO projects MUST meet HUD definition of homelessness (or as expanded by NOFO) and agencies MUST complete/provide homeless verification on ALL people served.

- □ Families with children include ALL families with children.
- *Under the CoC Program, households with children may not be categorically excluded from any project based solely on the basis of their familial status.
- Equal access.

Participant Eligibility (Special NOFO page 9)

Project funded through the 2022 Special NOFO must have the following eligibility criteria for project participants (cont'd.):

- Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside
 - □ Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - □ Category 4 Victim of DV, meeting category 1
- Rural Homelessness Set Aside (limited to serve counties defined as Rural in NOFO)
 - □ Category 1 literally homeless (if from TH, literally homeless prior to entry)
 - □ Category 2 imminent risk of homelessness
 - □ Category 4 victim of DV, meeting category 1
- All projects must participate in coordinated entry
- All projects must operate consistently with CoC Plan for serving people experiencing homelessness with Severe Service Needs described in Special NOFO

Severe Service Needs (page 14)

Severe Service Needs – Any Combination of the Following Factors:

- Facing significant challenges or functional impairments*, including any
 - Physical, mental, developmental or behavioral health disabilities regardless of the type of disability, which require a significant level of support in order to maintain permanent housing
 - *This factor focuses on the level of support needed and is not based on disability type
- High utilization of crisis or emergency services to meet basic needs, including but not limited to:
 - □ Emergency rooms
 - Jails, and
 - Psychiatric facilities;
- Currently living in an unsheltered situation or having a history of living in an unsheltered situation;
- Experiencing a vulnerability to illness or death;
- Having a risk of continued or repeated homelessness; and
- Having a vulnerability to victimization, including physical assault, trafficking or sex work.

Homelessness – Category 1

Category 1 – Literally Homeless

Individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, meaning:

- Has a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not meant for human habitation;
- Is living in a publicly or privately operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangements (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state, or local government programs); or
- Is exiting an institution where (s)he has resided for 90 days or less <u>and</u> who resided in an emergency shelter or place not meant for human habitation immediately before entering that institution

Homelessness – Category 2

Category 2 – Imminent Risk of Homelessness (Rural Set Aside Only)

Individual or family who will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence, provided that:

- Residence will be lost within 14 days of the date of application for homeless assistance;
- □ No subsequent residence has been identified; and
- The individual or family lacks the resources or support networks needed to obtain other permanent housing

Homelessness – Category 4

Category 4 – Fleeing/Attempting to Flee DV

Any individual or family who:

- Is fleeing, or attempting to flee, domestic violence; dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence against the individual or a family member, including a child, that has either taken place within the individual's or family's primary nighttime residence or has made the individual or family afraid to return to their primary nighttime residence;
- □ Has no other residence; and
- Lacks the resources or support networks to obtain other permanent housing.

Permanent Supportive Housing Projects -HUD Threshold

- Permanent Supportive Housing (permanent housing for people that are homeless and have a disability)
- The individual or family has a head of household with a diagnosable substance use disorder, serious mental illness, developmental disability (as defined in section 102 of the Developmental Disabilities Assistance Bill of Rights Act of 2000 (42 U.S.C. 15002)), post-traumatic stress disorder, cognitive impairments resulting from a brain injury, or chronic physical illness or disability.

Permanent Supportive Housing -Documenting Disability

Must be third party, and includes:

- Written verification from a professional licensed by the State to diagnose and treat the disability and certification that the disability is expected to be longcontinuing or of an indefinite duration and substantially impedes the individual's ability to live independently
- Written verification from SSA
- □ The receipt of a disability check
- Intake staff-recorded observation of a disability that is accompanied by evidence above within 45 days
- **Documentation also required for homeless status and length of time homeless/occasions of homelessness (to qualify as chronically homeless)

Homeless Verification All Projects

- □ A person is Homeless if <u>you can prove with adequate documentation</u>.
- All persons served MUST meet HUD eligibility criteria, and projects MUST complete/provide homeless verification on ALL persons served.

Examples of Persons NOT Eligible

- Persons with resources for housing
- In housing paying excessive rent, in substandard or overcrowded housing
- Living long-term with immediate family, relatives or friends
- Living in a congregate living facility (other than a shelter)
- Living in a hospital or institution (for > 90 days) where the institution has a policy that requires housing placement at discharge
- Youth or adults in state custody

All projects must participate in coordinated entry, and selection of program participants must be consistent with the CoC's Coordinated Entry process.

Grant Requirements

System for Award Management (SAM) Registration (Special NOFO Section V.A.1)

SAM Registration (Required)

- Project Applicants are required to be registered with <u>https://www.sam.gov/SAM</u>
- Annual renewal required
- More information on the SAM registration and required UEI (Unique Entity Identifier) number requirement go to: <u>https://sam.gov/content/duns-uei</u>
- HUD will not enter into a grant agreement with an entity that does not have a UEI Number or an active SAM registration.
- □ The process may be slow, so please start now.

Certification of Consistency with Consolidated Plan

- Each project must have a Certification of Consistency from jurisdiction(s) where projects are located
- CoCs must submit Certificate for all grantees in a jurisdiction combined in one form (and submit certifications in CoC Application)
- DCA staff will email local Consolidated Plan representatives and cc Project Applicants
- In order to go forward in the application process and be included in the CoC application to HUD, local jurisdictions need to review/approve all projects
- Applicants MUST follow-up with respective jurisdictions!

Certification of Consistency with Consolidated Plan (continued)

- Local Consolidated Planning Jurisdiction will need to review project application to determine if proposed project is consistent with their Consolidated Plan. Con Plan jurisdictions within the BoS CoC are:

- □ All other cities and counties fall under the State's Consolidated Planning jurisdiction.

Certification of Consistency with Consolidated Plan (cont'd.)

- Applicants that propose to claim a reservation or trust land geographic area and to locate a project on a reservation or trust land must include a tribal resolution from the tribe authorizing the applicant to do so (Special NOFO page 30-31, 37)
- Tribes do not need to include a tribal resolution to claim their own reservation or trust land or to a site a project on their own reservation or trust land.
- A tribal resolution is the formal manner in which the tribal government expresses its legislative will in accordance with its organic documents.
- In the absence of such organic documents, a written expression adopted pursuant to tribal practices will be acceptable.

2022 NOFO Educational Assurances

- Project Applicants must demonstrate that project has established policies and practices consistent with the laws related to the provision of educational and related services to individuals & families experiencing homelessness; and
- Projects serving families must demonstrate in application that a staff person has been designated to ensure that children are enrolled in school and receiving educational services, as appropriate (can include early childhood programs such as Head Start, Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, and McKinney-Vento education services); and
- Must address non-compliance (if applicable).
- Formal BoS CoC Educational Policy issued in 2015 for CoC and ESG funded projects.

2022 Compliance with Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Rule

- November 16, 2016, HUD published its VAWA final rule (81 FR 80798), which provides various protections to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking under the CoC Program and other HUD programs.
- Grants awarded under 2017 NOFA were the first CoC Program grants required to comply with the VAWA rule as provided in 24 CFR 578.99(j)(3).
- To enable full compliance with this rule, BoS CoC established (6/20/17) an emergency transfer plan under 24 CFR 578.7(d) and made related updates to the written standards for administering CoC program assistance under 24 CFR 578.7(a)(9)(ii), (iii) and (v).
- All CoC-funded projects must follow the Georgia Balance of State CoC Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Policies and Procedures established on 6/20/17 and be fully compliant, and if awared, New projects will need to meet this by the execution of the FY 2022 grant agreement in CoC.

Executive Order 12372 (Screen 1E. SF-424)

- There will be a general review of the submissions for completeness and accuracy and agencies will be expected to make any required corrections no later than October 7, 2022 (2:00 PM)
- Failure to complete the e-snaps portion of the application process and/or failure to respond and make the necessary corrections may result in a project not being included in the BoS CoC application to HUD
- **Applicant Profiles should have current Code of Conduct, if not on HUD listing), and all other required documents

CoC Project Review in E-snaps

- CoC to implement a thorough review and oversight process at the local level for new project applications submitted to HUD under the Special NOFO
- CoCs are expected to closely review information provided in each project application in order to ensure:
 - Eligibility of participants
 - Eligibility of activities
 - Data consistent in application
 - Narratives are fully responsive to question and that it meets all criteria for that question as required by Special NOFO and included in detailed instructions

Nonprofit Documentation

- Documentation of Applicant and Subrecipient Eligibility. Project applicants must attach appropriate documentation for each private nonprofit subrecipient organization identified as a nonprofit.
- Private nonprofit status is documented by submitting either:
 - □ IRS 501(c)(3) form or
 - Certification from licensed CPA that the organization meets each component of the definition of a private nonprofit organization as defined by 24 CFR 578.3

TDHE Documentation (New)

- Documentation of Applicant and Subrecipient Eligibility. Project applicants must attach appropriate documentation for each Indian Tribe or Tribally Designated Housing Entities (TDHEs) recipient and subrecipient organization identified in the application.
 TDHEs status documentation
- Applicants that propose to locate a project on a reservation or trust land must include a Tribal Resolution to locate a project on a reservation (Special NOFO)
 - Tribes do not need to include for a project on their own reservation or trust land
