Program Overview

The GHFA Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) Program (formerly known as Shelter Plus Care) provides permanent housing in connection with supportive services to persons who have a disability and are experiencing homelessness. The program provides rental assistance funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) accompanied by a range of supportive services funded by other sources. GHFA PSH is designed to serve a population that has been traditionally hard to reach and built on the best practice that housing and services should be connected in order to ensure stability for this population. Consequently, the program provides rental assistance that local sub-grantees must match with supportive services appropriate to the target population. The goal of the program is to assist homeless individuals and their families to increase their housing stability, skills and/or income, and self-sufficiency. Funding for GHFA PSH projects is awarded competitively through HUD's annual Continuum of Care process.
