1.1 INTRODUCTION TO THE REGIONAL PLAN

In 2019, the Northwest Georgia Regional Commission Council (Steering Committee) updated the Regional Plan with input from a Technical Advisory Committee, stakeholders, and the public. The Regional Plan includes Regional Goals and Policies; Regional Development Maps including the Regional Land Use Map, Conservation and Development Map, and Areas Requiring Special Attention Map; Regional Needs and Opportunities; and the Implementation Program including Performance Standards (Minimum and Excellence), Regional Work Program (2019-2023), and the Report of Accomplishments on the previous five-year work program. The Regional Plan meets Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) Regional Planning Requirements. The Plan aligns with the Regionally Important Resource Plan, local Comprehensive Plans, state plans, and regional plans of the Georgia Mountains Regional Commission, Atlanta Regional Commission, and Three Rivers Regional Commission.

1.2 ANNUAL REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION PROGRAM

NWGRC prepared this 2023 Annual Report on the Regional Plan Implementation Program according to Georgia Department of Community Affairs Regional Planning Requirements. It includes an annual Report of Accomplishments for FY 2022, a report on Local Government Minimum Standards, and additions or deletions to the current work program for 2023-2026. This report has been reviewed by the Northwest Georgia Regional Commission Council and regional stakeholders including representatives of the Georgia Department of Community Affairs and Georgia Department of Economic Development. 1.5 REGIONAL WORK PROGRAM REVISIONS

COVID-19 caused changes in operations for local governments, Regional Commissions and state agencies and some ongoing effects are still seen, however federal funding is now coming to state and local governments for infrastructure, broadband, and economic recovery. Developments of Regional Impact are seen often. Comprehensive planning is now more critical than ever. CARES Act Supplemental EDA funding is now in place for NWGRC Community and Economic Development including preparation of a regional resiliency plan and identifying local and regional projects. COVID-related SBA and EDA loan funding assistance was also provided by NWGRC. New projects are indicated with an underline, while projects that were completed or dropped are shown in ~~striketrough~~.




The Guinea Worm Eradication Program, led by The Carter Center, was honored with the Fourth Hideyo Noguchi Africa Prize in the medical services category at the residence of the Consul General of Japan Atlanta. The prize recognizes the program's efforts to make Guinea worm disease the first human disease to be eradicated since smallpox in 1980. "The Hideyo Noguchi Africa Prize signifies the government of Japan's high level of interest and involvement in the health and welfare of the people of Africa. We fully support the effort of the Carter Center in its effort to eradicate guile worms in Africa," said Consul General Mio Maeda in his remarks. Bill to ban mining near the Okefenokee is still stalled

A bill to ban mining near the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge is still stalled in a state House committee after receiving a long-awaited hearing. The proposed legislation was prompted by a controversial proposal by Twin Pines Minerals to mine for titanium and other minerals near the refuge.

House Bill 71, the Okefenokee Protection Act, has attracted more than 90 sponsors from both sides of the aisle since January. But the proposal has gone nowhere so far this session.

Lawmakers held their first hearing on the measure in the House Natural Resources and Environment's Resources Management Subcommittee. That came a week after Crossover Day, the deadline for bills to pass one chamber if they're going to succeed this year.

The subcommittee did not vote on the bill. Supporters and opponents of the bill each spoke for about an hour. Its author, Republican state Rep. Darlene Taylor said the Okefenokee is too important to risk harming.

"It cannot be replaced," she said of the National Wildlife Refuge. "A miscalculation cannot be corrected. The permanent damage to the entire ecosystem cannot be ruled out or fixed after it happens."

The bill's supporters expressed their concern that mining near the Okefenokee could harm the swamp — a

place many Georgians love that also draws tourists from around the world. Opponents of the bill echoed that love for the Okefenokee. But they said a ban on mining would be an overreach.

"Let me explain why I won't sign that bill: it walks all over private property rights," said Republican state Rep. John Corbett, who represents the area where the proposed mine would sit. "We're taking somebody's property and not compensating them."

The bill would not seize or condemn private property, but it would ban one possible use of land along a geologic feature known as Trail Ridge, to the east of the Okefenokee.

The legislation would also not affect the current proposed mine, but it would block future mining permits, including any expansions of the current footprint.

Supporters of the mine say it would bring much-needed jobs with minimal impact on the swamp.

"There's no way we'd do anything to harm the swamp," said Twin Pines president Steve Iagle in a video played during the hearing. "The mine will provide good-paying jobs in Charlton County and the surrounding areas."

But many are skeptical the jobs would really go to locals, or last in the long term. They point out that the swamp itself attracts tourism dollars.

Residents, scientists slam Okefenokee mining proposal. The state Environmental Protection Division is currently accepting public comment on the proposed mine

A large number of scientists

have come out against the mining proposal — more than 40 scientists signed a letter against it, and DGA hydrologist Rhett Jackson spoke against the mine at Tuesday's hearing — because of concerns that disrupting the ground on Trail Ridge would affect the water level in the swamp. Even a slight change in that water level would increase the frequency of drought and the likelihood of wildfires, according to Jackson.

Water modeling expert Sarah Fanday of GSI Environmental, a consulting firm working for Twin Pines, pushed back against those concerns at the subcommittee hearing, stressing that the mine would only disrupt small areas at any given time. He argued the mine would only stand to change the swamp's water level by a fraction of an inch, if at all.

Mine opponents have said even a minimal threat to the Okefenokee isn't worth it.

"It would be a tremendous mistake to take this kind of risk," said Cliff Oxford, an author and entrepreneur who grew up in Waycross, near the swamp. "I think

Georgia would have a scar, not only in the swamp, but it would be a scar for this state forever."

Although the subcommittee did not vote on the bill, Taylor remained optimistic. Because this is the first year of the two-year session, bills carry over to next year. "The bill is still alive," she wrote in an email after the hearing. "It can be heard and addressed next year."

Taylor has also proposed a study committee to look into the issue of mining on Trail Ridge. A hearing on that proposal is expected in the Natural Resources Committee.
