COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2017 BAKER COUNTY AND THE CITY OF NEWTON



The purpose of a comprehensive plan is to provide a guide for local government officials and other community leaders for making everyday decisions that are supportive of the community's stated goals for its future.

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Introduction

The Baker County Comprehensive Plan was mandated by the Georgia Planning Act 1989. The plan represents participation by both the City of Newton and Baker County. The plan provides guidance for city and county officials as they make decisions and manage and promote quality growth and development that is sustainable. Georgia Comprehensive Planning process has been simplified and communities are required to include the following element; however other elements may be included based on community needs and desires. The Comprehensive Plan includes a Community Work Program Element which outlines specific strategies communities will strive to meeting in the following five years, and must also include a report of the local government's accomplishments. The Plan also includes a Service Delivery Strategy (SDS), which is a process that gives local governments and authorities the opportunity to agree on the delivery of services in an effective and cost efficient manner to its citizens. The Act intent is to provide flexibility for local governments and minimize duplication or competition and resolve disputes for local service delivery.

The Baker County Comprehensive Plan was prepared using the process outlined in the Georgia's Minimum Planning Standards and Procedures. The required planning elements include Community Goals, Needs and Opportunities, Community Work Program, Economic Development, and Land Use. The Baker County Plan includes a Transportation element made possible through funding from the Georgia Department of Transportation.

Baker County and Newton Georgia were formed from the eastern portion of Early County and is named for Colonel John Baker, A hero of the American Revolutionary War. Baker County is included in the Albany, GA Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA). The county seat is Newton. Both the City and County suffered an economic blow, but are trying to turning things around. The county and city are home to the Flint River and both have an abundant supply of natural resources.

Southwest Georgia Regional Commission Role

The Southwest Georgia Regional Commission's Planning Department facilitated the 2017 Comprehensive Plan update for Baker County. Leading community input sessions and Steering Committee meetings, the Southwest Georgia Regional Commission (SWGRC) team gathered feedback and guidance from the public, and used this information to assemble the Comprehensive Plan and made recommendations that are reflective of the community's desires. The elected officials of each local government hold ultimate responsibility and authority to approve and direct the implementation of the Comprehensive Plan documents.

Public Involvement

The Baker County Plan had strong community support. All meetings were well attended and the City and County identified stakeholders that were present and engaged. The elected officials from both municipalities also participated and were actively involved and served on the steering committee. The Steering Committee included both public and private citizens. It was evident that Newton and Baker County resident wanted to be involved by the number of individuals that participated.

Baker County and the City of Newton are extremely small in size but all efforts were made to work with officials to identify stakeholders. Community Profile

This section examines the demographics of Baker County and the City of Newton. The following is a more detailed profile on for the County and City. The information contained on the following pages was obtained from the U.S. Census (2010 and 2015 American Community Survey Estimates).

Baker County is the least populous county in the region and over the past decades the population has been declining. Persons over 18 years of age represent more than 75% of the population in both Baker and Newton. Those over 65 years of age are growing in Baker and Newton as well as the region. This number is expected to continue to increase and can be explained by increased longevity, a pattern that has been apparent for several decades. People are living longer and having fewer children. With these demographics, local leaders should focus on areas such as housing, transportation and recreation to make the community more age friendly.

Single family housing predominates the housing stock for Baker and Newton and owner occupied represents over 50% of the housing that is occupied. Like other communities Baker and the City of Newton have substandard housing this impacts growth and development. Residents moving in the area want good quality housing to select from. Both the City and County suffered severely in the 1994 flood, more than half of their housing stock was lost and they are working to recover. The County has several plantations that limits the availability of land for development. Housing in rural communities is challenging and funding is extremely limited. In fact, despite lower costs of living and substantially lower housing costs, the housing opportunities in rural communities are limited in part due to limited economic opportunities and struggling industries. Local leaders must focus on

economic development and housing simultaneously in order to build a strong economy and community.

Vision:

A very interactive session took place to create the vision statement for both the county and city:

Baker County and the City of Newton will provide professional, economical and innovative services to promote health, safety and quality of life for all residents.

Goals and Policies

The Community Goals are the most important part of the plan, for they identify the community's direction for the future. The purpose of the goals are to lay out a road map for the community's future through a public process involving community partners and other stakeholders in the decision making process about the future of Baker County and the City of Newton.

The following goals and policies were identified to guide the City and County in its decision making process and produce a desired outcome for county and city officials. Both municipalities sought goals and policies that will have a positive impact on the community.

Economic Prosperity

Baker County and the City of Newton will encourage development or expansion of businesses and industries that are suitable for the community.

- We will support programs for retention, expansion and creation of businesses that are a good fit for our community's economy in terms of job skill requirements and linkages to existing businesses.
- We will target reinvestment to declining, existing neighborhoods, vacant or underutilized sites or buildings in preference to new economic development projects in Greenfield (previously undeveloped) areas of our community.
- We will take into account access to housing and impacts on transportation when considering economic development projects.

Resource Management

Baker County and the City of Newton will promote the efficient use of natural resources and identify and protect environmentally sensitive areas of the community.

- The protection and conservation of our community's resources will play an important role in the decision-making process when making decisions about future growth and development.
- We will minimize inefficient land consumption and encourage development in order to preserve green open space and natural resource areas.
- Infrastructure networks will be developed to steer new development away from sensitive natural resource areas.

Efficient Land Use

Baker County and the City of Newton will maximize the use of existing infrastructure and minimize the costly conversion of undeveloped land at the periphery of the community.

- Our community will use land efficiently
- We will encourage the development of downtown as a vibrant center of the community in order to improve overall attractiveness and local quality of life.
- We support new land uses that contribute to protecting the environment and preserving meaningful open space.

Local Preparedness

Baker County and the City of Newton will identify and put in place the prerequisites for the type of future the community seeks to achieve.

- We will seek ways for new growth to pay for itself (in terms of public investment in infrastructure and services to support the development) to the maximum extent possible.
- We will use planned infrastructure expansion to support development in areas identified (in the comprehensive plan) as suitable for such development.
- We will make efficient use of existing infrastructure and public facilities in order to minimize the need for costly new/expanded facilities and services.

Sense of Place

Baker County and the City of Newton will protect and enhance the community's unique qualities.

• We will encourage new development to locate in suitable locations in order to protect natural resources, environmentally sensitive areas, or valuable historic, archaeological or cultural resources from encroachment.

- We will work to redirect development pressure away from agricultural areas in order to conserve farmland to protect and preserve this important component of our community.
- We will ensure safe and adequate supplies of water through protection of ground and surface water sources.

Regional Cooperation

Baker County and the City of Newton will cooperate with neighboring jurisdictions to address shared needs. Developing collaborative solutions for regional issues such as protection of shared natural resources, development of transportation network, or creation of a tourism plan, and internet and broadband services.

- We will seek opportunities to share services and facilities with neighboring jurisdictions when mutually beneficial.
- We will work jointly with neighboring jurisdictions on developing solutions for shared regional issues (such as growth management, watershed protection)
- We will pursue joint processes for collaborative planning and decision-making with neighboring jurisdictions

Housing Option

Baker County and the City of Newton will promote an adequate range of safe, affordable, inclusive, and resource efficient housing in the community.

- We will increase opportunities for low-to-moderate income families to move into affordable owner-occupied housing.
- We will seek to balance the supply of housing and employment in our community and consider their location in relation to each other.
- We will stimulate infill housing development in existing neighborhoods.

Transportation Options

Baker County and the City of Newton will address the transportation needs, challenges and opportunities of all community residents.

- We will take into account access to housing and impacts on transportation when considering economic development projects.
- We will make decisions that encourage walking, biking, car-pooling, and other alternative transportation choices.
- We will target transportation improvements to support desired development patterns for the community (recognizing that ready availability of transportation creates demand

for land development in adjacent areas).

Educational Opportunities

Baker County and the City of Newton will make educational and training opportunities readily available to enable all community residents to improve their job skills, adapt to technological advances, or pursue life ambitions.

- We will work with the local school board to encourage school location decisions that support the community's overall growth and development plans.
- We will consider the employment needs and skill levels of our existing population in making decisions on proposed economic development projects.

Community Health

Baker County and the City of Newton will ensure that all community residents, regardless of age, ability, or income, have access to critical goods and services, safe and clean neighborhoods, and good work opportunities.

- We are committed to providing quality, affordable and accessible to healthcare and recreational opportunities that ensure the quality of life for all citizens.
- We are committed to providing pleasant, accessible public gathering places and parks throughout the community.

Economic Development

Baker County and the City of Newton do not currently have an Economic Developer or Chamber of Commerce. The Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) as developed by the Southwest Georgia Regional Commission under a grant from the US Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration and is hereby incorporated by reference into this Comprehensive Plan to serve as the Economic Development Element for Baker County and the City of Newton

The Southwest Georgia Regional Commission's (SWGRC) Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) was designed to bring together the public and private sectors in the creation of an economic roadmap to diversify and strengthen the regional economy. The SWGRC CEDS analyzed the regional economy and serves as a guide for establishing regional goals and objectives, a regional plan of action, and the investment priorities and funding sources. Portions of the CEDS for Baker County are included in this plan element and are listed below.

Baker County is a rural county with a population of 3,451, according to the 2010 Census, which is a population decrease of 623 from the 2000 Census. The median household income is \$44,297.00. Primarily an agricultural community, Baker County produces peanuts, cotton, canola, poultry, and beef. Baker County has 125 businesses that employ 565 people. There is one incorporated city in Baker County, the City of Newton that also serves as the County seat.

The City of Newton was incorporated January 20, 1872 and is located right on the Flint River.

Baker County is home to two significant water bodies, the Flint River and the Ichawaynochaway Creek. Baker County has numerous strengths, attractions and commodities for enjoying life. Some to include the many plantations, large agricultural life, forest areas, river corridor, a flood



plain, downtown Newton and cross roads community. Also, you can add additional strengths such as residential areas, commercial node, boating, hunting, fishing, new county schools, beautiful canopy roads, and growth in the minority population. In 2001, the Baker County Board of Education voted to separate their school system from the Mitchell County School System and build a K-12 facility that currently has about 334 students. There are also weaknesses, the continued flooding, inadequate cultural and recreational facilities, high demand on public services and facilities due to the increase in youth and elderly populations, high levels of poverty, and possible water contamination from aging septic systems.

Traditionally, Baker County's economy has been based on agriculture and over 90% of the Baker County territory is dedicated to it. Some 64% of the population in Baker County work outside the county in the MSA area (Dougherty County) resulting in a loss of sales tax revenues. Having such a high percentage of the economically active residents of Baker commuting proves the severe absence of local jobs. Baker County encompasses 347 square miles (222,080 acres) and has one of the lowest population densities in the state. Most of the land is used for agriculture and forestry. Agriculture accounts for 28% of land use in the unincorporated areas. Nearly half (47%) of the agricultural and forestry lands are located on large plantations. Many of these plantations have active farming and forestry operations, although a significant portion is in conservation use, including the large tract that is home to the J. W. Jones Ecological Center.

The J. W. Jones Ecological Research Center was established in 1991 as a research, conservation and education center. It is a 29,000 acre outdoor laboratory. It is a nonprofit organization that employs over 100 people. Graduate students from all over the country have completed thesis research with on-site advisors. The original acreage was established as a quail hunting reserve in the 1920's by Robert W. Woodruff, who became the long term chairman of the Coco-Cola Company. The center has an enormous economic impact for the City and County

Included below are goals and objectives from the CEDS which are aligned with the current economic development goals of Baker County and the City of Newton:

<u>Goal:</u>

Our community will expand existing industries.

Objective:

We will develop and support the increase that existing industries will expand into the region.

<u>Goal</u>:

Our community will provide a well trained workforce, professional, technical and skilled, capable of accommodating new industry and maintaining existing industry.

Objective:

We will improve education attainment by reducing high school drop-out rate.



Transportation

Baker County and the City of Newton have a combined population of 4, 105. The county has more than sufficient roadway network for the types of functions it now serves. This system provides for the existing land use activities and at the current rate of growth will be ample for the years to come. Local residents in the City of Newton have expressed concern due to the lack of paved roads and the problems they cause when it rains. This prompted the City of Newton to apply for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) to help repair some of the roads in the city.

Public transportation provides the only means of transportation for some people within the county. The existing public transportation system, however minimal the service, enables people to travel to many commercial, medical and residential locations. The Southwest Georgia Rural Transportation System provides demand responsive services to 14 counties in Southwest Georgia. This system serves human service agencies and the general public in Baker County from 6 am to 8 pm Monday through Friday. These transportation services are provided through the Department of Human Resources (DHR). Access to some form of public transit is already and will remain a significant issue for residents of both Baker County and the City of Newton.

The transportation system in Baker County is sparse. Baker County has 361 miles of road roughly half of which are paved. 78 miles of the road system are State Highway while the county maintains 272 miles of road, of which 175 miles are unpaved. The county's major federal and state routes are: GA 91, GA 37, GA 216, GA 200, and GA 253. Most of these routes are two lane routes.

The annual average daily traffic (ADDT) in Baker County is moderate on the most used roads in Baker County. These roads are GA 91, GA 37 followed by GA 216, GA 200, and GA 253. Maintenance of the roads is handled by the road department.




Future Land Use


Land use for small communities must maintain rural characters and strength economic potential. Rural Communities need to identify strategies that they are able to implement with their limited resources. Appropriate land use supports the establishment of agricultural activities and non-agriculture activities that encourages sustainable rural development, while respecting the rights of rural community and residents.

The future land use categories are not zoning classifications. Instead, they act to inform leaders on decisions regarding rezoning and development. They will identify the specific use that is proposed for a parcel. The future land use categories are defined below:

Land Use	Classifications
Residential	The predominant use of land is residential, single-family and multi-family dwelling units
Commercial	Non-industrial business uses, including retail sales, office, service and entertainment facilities, organized in one building or grouped together in a shopping center or office building.
Industrial	Land dedicated to manufacturing facilities, processing plants, factories, warehousing and wholesale trade facilities, mining or mineral extraction activities, or other similar uses.
Public/Institutional	Includes certain state, federal or local government uses, and institutional land uses. Government uses include government building complexes, police and fire stations, libraries, prisons, post offices, schools, military installations, etc.
Transportation/Communication/Utilities	Includes such uses as major transportation routes, public transit stations, power generation plants, railroad facilities, radio towers, telephone switching stations, airports, port facilities or other similar uses.
Parks/Recreation/Conservation	Land dedicated to active or passive recreational uses. These areas may be either publicly or privately owned and may include playgrounds, public parks, nature preserves, wildlife management areas, national forests, golf courses, recreation centers or similar uses.
Agriculture/Forestry	Land dedicated to farming (fields, lots, pastures, farmsteads, specialty farms, livestock production, etc.), agriculture, or commercial timber or pulpwood harvesting.
Undeveloped/Vacant	Lots or tracts of land that are served by typical urban public services (water, sewer, etc.) but have not been developed for a specific use or were developed for a specific use that has since been abandoned.






