I. What is the Housing Inventory Count?

Overview

Housing Inventory Count (HIC)

- The HIC is a point-in-time inventory of projects within the CoC that provide beds and units dedicated to serving persons who are homeless. It is intended to provide HUD and CoC's with information about the shelter and housing capacity of homeless crisis response systems.
- The HIC should reflect the number of beds and units available on the night designated for the count that are dedicated to serve persons who are homeless (and, for permanent housing projects, persons who were homeless at entry), per the HUD homeless definition.

II. What is the Point In Time Count?

Overview

2024 Point In Time (PIT) Count

- The 2024 Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a census or count of all sheltered and unsheltered persons experiencing homelessness on a single night in January (i.e., at a given point in time), including some required demographic information and characteristics about persons as defined in the annual data collection Notice.
- **Please note:** the 2024 PIT will include a Sheltered count (emergency shelter, transitional housing, rapid re-housing, and permanent supportive housing) and an Unsheltered count



MONDAY, JANUARY 22, 2024

All endeavors will need to determine where the person was sleeping on the night of the count!

Based on HUD definition, “night of the count” means sunset on Monday, January 22, 2024, through sunrise on Tuesday, January 23, 2024.


Sheltered Count Methodology

Survey Tools

HUD Reporting

How is the Methodology Adopted?

DCA develops a suggested methodology based on previous years and current HUD guidance. It then goes through several steps for approval and implementation.



Elements Defined in Methodology

Unsheltered Count

One specific night during the final 10 days of January is chosen for the unsheltered count, usually a Monday.

Street count activities are for one night.

Service based count lasts for 7 days after the night of the street count.

Target coverage area for physical counts is roughly defined.

The survey tool for the count is defined.

Sheltered Count

The sheltered count utilizes an agency-level survey sent to all known emergency shelter and transitional housing facilities.

Data submitted from agencies is verified in the Homeless Management Information System to the extent possible.

All data is provided for the same night of the unsheltered count.

Predictive Model

DCA contracts with a research institution or technical support firm (Simtech Solutions) to develop a predictive statistical model.

Predictive model uses data from physical counts to estimate homeless populations in areas not physically counted.

Predictive model data are combined with physical count data (unsheltered) for final submission to HUD.

Elements Defined in 2024 Methodology

Sheltered Count

The sheltered count utilizes an agency-level survey sent to all known emergency shelter and transitional housing facilities.

Data submitted from agencies is verified in the Homeless Management Information System to the extent possible.

All data is provided for the same night of the unsheltered count.

Predictive Model Features

- Developed under contract with Simtech Solutions
- Updated version of previous model from Kennesaw State University
- Incorporates variables specific to homelessness based on research
- Commonly used in Point of Time counts nationally
- Considers varying demographics in counties across the state
- Margins of error may be included if feasible

Unsheltered Count Extrapolation




Data from the physical homeless counts are used to extrapolate subpopulation figures for HUD reporting purposes.

HUD Homelessness Data Exchange

The ultimate purpose of the PIT count is to facilitate reporting to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. All CoCs are required to submit data from the PIT count using the Homelessness Data Exchange (HDX) website.

IV. Sheltered Homeless Count

Provider-level Survey: Overview

2024 Housing Inventory & Sheltered Homeless Count Overview

- Similar to 2023, the Balance of State CoC will conduct the 2024 Housing Inventory and Sheltered Homeless Point In Time count by distributing a provider-level survey to all Homeless Assistance agencies (funded and non-funded/ HMIS-participating and Non-HMIS participating) within the Balance of State 152-county jurisdiction.
- Survey data collected will be regarding Housing bed inventory and homeless count of the night of the count, Monday, January 22.
- Survey Submission Deadline: Wednesday, January 31.
- Completed surveys are submitted via a link
 - No paper surveys should be collected this year
- Results will establish the housing capacity of the Balance of State CoC and count of sheltered persons on the night of the count.





- **For CoC-funded RRH projects**, if a client is actively enrolled in a different CoC, the housing inventory and households **should be reported to the CoC that is paying for the project.**
- CoC program recipients cannot pay for site-based facilities outside of the CoC geography, but ESG recipients can. **Site-based facilities should only be reported in the CoC where the facility is located.**
- **Households in scattered-site housing** located outside of the CoC that is funding the assistance should still be **counted with the CoC that is paying for their assistance.**
