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Project Location: Scattered residential sites throughout Spalding County; work will occur primarily in zip code 30223

Length of time covered by this review: Five (5) years

Description of the Proposed Project [24 CFR 50.12 & 58.32; 40 CFR 1508.25]:

This Tier I Broad Level review will address the following activities under the Homeowner Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Program (HRRP):

- 1. Single-family home repair/rehabilitation.
- 2. Single-family home reconstruction within the existing footprint or with no substantial change in footprint on the same parcel.
- 3. Manufactured Home Unit (MHU) repair/rehabilitation.
- 4. MHU replacement
- 5. MHU reconstruction with a single-family home (stick-built) with no substantial change in footprint on the same parcel.
- 6. Elevation as required under 24 CFR 55.20.

Please note that reconstruction activities include the demolition or removal of the existing damaged stick built home or MHU. Replacement activities include the demolition or removal of the existing damaged MHU.

Statement of Purpose and Need for the Proposal [40 CFR 1508.9(b)]:

On January 12, 2023, Georgia was subjected to strong winds and thunderstorms which resulted in an onslaught of as many as 14 tornadoes and led to widespread power outages across Metro Atlanta and Central Georgia. Subsequently, a Presidential declaration of a major disaster for the State of Georgia (FEMA-4685-DR) was issued January 16, 2023. On November 27, 2023, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced that the State of Georgia will receive \$12,595,000.00 in funding to support long-term recovery efforts following the January 2023 tornadoes through the Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA). Approximately \$6,072,250.00 of the above referenced funding amount will be used for HRRP activities. This includes \$4,875,800.00 designated for Spalding County, identified as a HUD Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) county, and \$1,196,450.00 allocated across the Grantee identified MID counties of Butts, Henry, Jasper, Meriwether, Newton, and Troup.

Community Development Block Grant- Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funding is designed to address needs that remain after all other assistance has been exhausted. The funding allocated to the State of Georgia will be used for housing activities and will include mitigation measures to facilitate the long-term recovery and resilience against future storm events.

Existing Conditions and Trends [24 CFR 58.40(a)]:

The Georgia DCA HRRP is assisting those that have the greatest need, including historically underserved communities. Therefore, applications from the most socially vulnerable populations will be prioritized. Within Spalding County, the City of Griffin noted that they were already faced with a concerning housing shortage prior to the storm. This was further exacerbated by the events of January 12. Griffin noted that due to their nuisance abatement program, there was a deficit of just over 300 dwelling units. Compounded by the additional 1,007 units impacted by the storm as reported in their Safety Assessment, the city continues to be in vital need of assistance to combat these surmounting challenges. Despite community efforts to address these short and long-term impacts, additional support is integral to not only restore, but augment resilience against future disasters by developing communities into healthier, well-adapting strongholds.

Per the NEPAssist mapper, there are seven airports in Spalding County; specifically, the River Bend Airport (private), Pecan Patch Airstrip Airport (private), Beaverbrook Aerodrome Airport (private), Griffen-Spalding County Airport (public), Cedar Ridge Airport (private), Pinebrook Estates Airport (private), and Brook Bridge Aerodrome Airport (private). Per the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) National Plan of Integrated Airport Systems (NPIAS), there are no military airports in Spalding County. If the site is located within the search radius identified above, the Runway Protection Zone/Clear Zone (RPZ/CZ) and/or Accident Potential Zone (APZ) runway map will be reviewed. Insurance Program (NFIP). It is HUD policy that flood insurance is not required for a federal project consisting of minor repairs if all aggregated repairs cost less than the NFIP's maximum deductible of \$10,000. However, when flood insurance is required, federal assistance cannot be used in communities that do not participate in the NFIP.

Per the FEMA Flood Map Service Center FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs), there are SFHAs located throughout Spalding County. According to the NFIP Community Status Book, Spalding County is a participating community in the NFIP along with some municipalities. The City of Orchard Hill, located in Spalding County, is not a participating community. See attachment 3 for FIRMs and Community Status Book.

Tier II Site-Specific Review requirements:

The applicable effective FEMA FIRM panel will be reviewed for each proposed site to determine if the residential structure is located within a SFHA. Flood insurance is mandatory if any portion of the structure receiving HUD funding is located within a FEMA-designated SFHA and the total cost of repairs exceeds \$10,000. If flood insurance is not required, HUD still recommends that all insurable structures maintain flood insurance under the NFIP.

Federal assistance cannot be used for proposed sites located within the incorporated boundaries of the City of Orchard Hill if the residential structure requires flood insurance.

 The Clean Air Act is administered by the U.S.

 Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and

Clean Air Act, as amended, particularly section 176(c) & (d); 40 CFR Parts 6, 51, 93

sets National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS). To demonstrate compliance with the NAAQS, HUD-funded projects located in counties with a nonattainment or maintenance status for any criteria pollutant must demonstrate conformity with the appropriate State Implementation Plan (SIP).

According to the Georgia Nonattainment/ Maintenance Status for Each County by Year for All Criteria Pollutants (EPA Greenbook), Spalding County is in attainment status for all criteria pollutants except moderate maintenance status for 8-hour Ozone (1997 – NAAQS revoked) and PM-2.5 (1997 – NAAQS revoked). The proposed project activities do not involve new construction or conversion of land use and are exempt from Georgia air quality State Implementation permitting Plan (SIP) requirements under Rule 391-3-1-.03(6)(i)3 since emissions will be below the established Additionally, thresholds. the Program activities will not result in any new sources of air pollution. Therefore, the Program's proposed activity emissions are considered de minimus (40 CFR 93.153(c)(2)(x)) and are in compliance with the SIP. The general conformity rule does not apply to actions which are either exempt or presumed to conform. Furthermore, per HUD guidance (Air Quality - Environmental Review - HUD Exchange), federal projects must conform to Clean Air Act requirements if they may constitute a significant new source of air pollution. If a project does not involve new construction or conversion of land use as indicated above, it can be assumed that its emissions are below de minimis levels and the project is in compliance with the Act.

Any air quality impacts from construction related activities would be short term. Best Management Practices (BMPs) will be implemented to reduce any potential impacts from dust and emissions during construction.

		Based on the above, the proposed project activities are in compliance and no further review is required.

Contamination and Toxic Substances 24 CFR Part 50.3(i) & 58.5(i)(2)	Yes No	It is HUD policy, as described in 24 CFR Part 50.3(i) and 24 CFR 58.5(i)(2), that all properties proposed for use in HUD programs be free of hazardous materials, contamination, toxic chemicals and gasses, and radioactive substances, where a hazard could affect the health and safety of occupants or conflict with the intended utilization of the property. In addition, particular attention should be given to any proposed site on or in the general proximity of such areas as dumps, landfills, industrial sites, or other locations that contain, or may have contained, hazardous wastes. Per the NEPAssist map, Spalding County has multiple EPA regulated facilities, including

air pollution (ICIS_AIR), toxic releases (TRI), hazardous waste (RCRAInfo), water discharges (NPDES), and brownfields (ACRES).

Tier II Site-Specific Review requirements: Each individual site will be evaluated for contamination concerns during the Tier II site-specific review. Databases maintained by U.S. EPA and state, local, and tribal quality departments environmental agencies will be reviewed to screen for potential on-site and off-site facilities that could pose health and safety problems and toxic clean-up sites that are presently under analysis or remediation. Examples databases are U.S. EPA's databases in NEPAssist, Georgia Department of Public Health Environmental Data, State Hazardous Site Inventory, etc. A site inspection will also be completed for each proposed site location. Sites known or suspected to be contaminated by toxic chemicals or radioactive materials include but are not limited to sites: (i) listed on an EPA Superfund National Priorities or CERCLA List, or equivalent State list; (ii) located within 3,000 feet of a toxic or solid waste landfill site; or (iii) with underground storage tank.

The review will document that the site does not contain any hazards that could affect the health and safety of occupants or conflict with the intended utilization of the property.

If a potential hazard is found during the review, an ASTM Phase I will be completed for the site to show that the hazard will not affect the health and safety of occupants or conflict with the continued residential use of the property.

If hazards are present that affect occupants or conflict with residential use, one of the following may occur: 1) Mitigation measures may be implemented to ensure the safety of occupants, 2) the contamination may be removed, 3) the site may be deemed unusable.

Radon

Radon is being evaluated since the proposed project is for residential structures that will be occupied for at least four (4) hours per day. HUD approved available science-based data was used to determine whether the proposed project site is located in an area that has average documented radon levels at or above 4.0 pCi/L. The University of Georgia Cooperative Extension Radon Map was used to determine the average radon levels. A total of 603 tests were completed in Spalding County between 1990 and 2022. A total of 120 tests or 19.9% of the tests results were elevated and the highest result was 50.7. The CDC National Environmental Public Health Tracking Network (Data Explorer) was also consulted for data reported to the CDC by labs on mean, pre-mitigation radon level measurements in tested buildings within Spalding County, covering a 10-year period (2008-2017). A total of 68 tests were completed over the 10-year period and the average radon level was 4.8 pCi/L. Therefore, one of the following conditions will be added to the Tier II Site-Specific review:

-After replacement or reconstruction of housing is completed, radon testing will be performed using ANSI/AARST standards or Do-It-Yourself (DIY) kits. If the radon levels are determined to be under 4pCi/L, then no further action is required. Radon test results for each dwelling unit must be submitted to GA DCA. If the radon levels are determined to be at or above 4 pCi/L, then a radon mitigation plan must be documented, implemented, and submitted to GA DCA. The mitigation plan must: identify the radon level; describe the radon reduction system that will installed; establish an ongoing maintenance plan; establish a reasonable timeframe for implementation; and require post-installation testing by a licensed radon professional, where feasible.

-After rehabilitation of housing is completed, radon testing will be performed using ANSI/AARST standards or Do-It-Yourself

(DIY) kits. Radon test results for each dwelling unit must be submitted to GA DCA. If the radon levels are determined to be under 4 pCi/L, then no further action is required. If the radon levels are determined to be at or above 4 pCi/L, then a radon mitigation plan must be documented, implemented, and submitted to GA DCA. The mitigation plan must: identify the radon level; describe the radon reduction system that will be installed; establish an ongoing maintenance plan; a reasonable timeframe establish implementation; and require post-installation testing by a licensed radon professional, where feasible.

Lead-Based Paint and Asbestos

Proposed activities involving rehabilitation, replacement, or reconstruction may contain asbestos-containing material (ACM) or leadbased paint (LBP). These are considered hazardous materials that may affect the health of occupants. All activities must comply with federal, state, and local regulations regarding LBP and ACM disposal or remediation. For houses constructed before January 1, 1978, an LBP Risk Assessment Report will be completed and attached to the Tier II Site-Specific review. All lead-based paint inspections, risk assessments, or abatement of lead-based paint must be done by a Georgia-Certified Lead Services Firm and a Georgia-Certified Worker, Supervisor, Inspector, Risk Assessor, or Project Designer. All LBP debris will be properly disposed of in a Georgia Department of Natural Resources, Environmental Protection Division (EPD) approved landfill facility in accordance with applicable regulations.

If suspect ACM are found during replacement, reconstruction, or rehabilitation activities, it should be assumed to contain asbestos until laboratory analysis can confirm or deny their asbestos content. The asbestos inspection and the removal of ACM must be done by asbestos professionals in accordance with all applicable federal, State and local

The Endangered Species Act (ESA) of 1973, as amended, and its implementing regulations were designed to protect and recover species in danger of extinction and the critical habitats they depend upon. HUD funded projects must consider potential impacts of proposed projects to endangered and threatened species and critical habitats. On July 11, 2024, the USFWS issued a "Clearance to Proceed with Federally-Insured Loan and Grant Project Requests" letter providing guidance and clearance for existing single-family housing. Under the section, Description of Projects Covered (page 2), the following types of activities will generally have No Effect on species protected under the ESA: a. The proposed project can be completed without additional clearing of undeveloped areas (e.g., native habitat, agricultural areas, pasture, etc.) beyond the original footprint of the existing project in order to complete the action request. b. There are no federally endangered or threatened species using the existing structures or within the project area. c. The project is not within designated critical habitat (DCH) for any federally listed species (by rule, DCH does not include already developed parcels). d. Specific Service field office requirements and exclusions are met for the state within which the project is located (Attachment A).
		The proposed project involves the rehabilitation, replacement, reconstruction, and/or elevation of multiple existing residential dwellings through the county. All

work will occur on the existing parcels and can be completed without additional clearing of undeveloped areas beyond the original footprint of the existing dwellings. The proposed activities are on developed land and do not contain suitable habitat for federally listed endangered or threatened species. There is also no work in water so there is no effect to inland aquatic species protected under ESA. The Service letter was signed by the Georgia Ecological Services Field Office, and there are no additional applicable exclusions or restrictions. Therefore, all conditions are met and no further coordination with the Service is required.

There are additional responsibilities under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) and the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (BGEPA) to protect native birds from project-related impacts. The following considerations listed on page 3 of the Clearance letter will be followed to avoid impacts to these non-federally listed species:

Bald Eagles: If any of the above-referenced (rehabilitation. activities replacement, reconstruction, and/or elevation) proposed to occur within 660 feet of an active (Haliaeetus alternate bald eagle leucocephalus) nest during the nesting season (October 1 through May 15), the applicant or their designated agent will coordinate with the agency responsible for managing wildlife in their state (Georgia Department of Natural Resources, Wildlife Resources Division).

Migratory Birds: If any native birds are using the structures for nesting, actions will be taken to avoid disturbing adults, nests, eggs, or chicks as this could lead to a potential violation of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. If nests are present or any birds are using the structures regularly for roosting purposes, the applicant or their designated agent will coordinate with the Service's Georgia Ecological Field Office and visit the Service's Migratory Bird Program website at https://www.fws.gov/library/collections/avoi

		ding-and-minimizing-incidental-take- migratory- birds for recommendations on how impacts can be avoided and minimized. The project is in compliance with this section. development to the extent practicable. The EO 11988 and EO 13690 Floodplain Management Determination 8-Step Decision Making Process was completed per 24 CFR §55.20. The 8-step review identified and evaluated practicable alternatives to locating the action within the FFRMS floodplain and the potential impacts on the FFRMS floodplain from the proposed action. It has been determined that there are no practicable alternatives for residential properties located within the FFRMS floodplain. All residential properties located within the FFRMS floodplain will be elevated or floodproofed to minimize the potential adverse impacts to lives, property, and natural values within the floodplain and to restore and preserve the values of the FFRMS floodplain. Final Public Notice, proof of posting, and any received comments will be added to the ERR upon completion.

Tier II Site-Specific Review requirements:

HUD financial assistance may not be approved for buildings that modify or occupy the floodway (24 CFR 55.8(a)(1)(ii)). Therefore, residential structures shall not be located within the regulatory floodway.

24 CFR Part 55 (with the exception of flood insurance requirements in 55.5) does not apply to: a project site, of which an incidental portion is situated in the FFRMS floodplain (not including the floodway, LiMWA, or coastal high hazard area), when 1) the proposed project site does not include any existing or proposed buildings or improvements that modify or occupy the FFRMS floodplain and 2) the proposed project will not result in any new construction in or modifications of a wetland (24 CFR 55.12(g)).

For activities considered minor repairs or improvements that do not meet the thresholds for substantial improvement, the 8-step decision making process does not apply, per CFR 55.13(b). Substantial improvement is defined as "any repair, reconstruction, modernization, or improvement of a structure, including a manufactured housing unit, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the improvement or repair is started or before the damage occurred".

For substantial rehabilitation or improvement, replacement, and reconstruction activities, the effective FEMA FIRM panel and Preliminary FIRM panel (if available) will be reviewed for each proposed site to determine if the subject residential structure is located within the FFRMS floodplain. The extent of the FFRMS floodplain will be determined using one of the following methods: the Climate-Informed-Science-Approach (CISA) which applies the best-available, actionable, hydrologic and hydraulic data; the 0.2-Percent-Annual-Chance (500-Year) Flood Approach which uses the elevation and flood hazard area as depicted by the 0.2-Percent-Annual-Chance floodplain; or the Freeboard-Value-Approach (FVA) = Base-Flood-Elevation (BFE) +2'.For sites located within the FFRMS floodplain, the Programmatic 8-Step Process will be applied, including elevation or other flood risk minimization measures. minimum elevation floodproofing or requirement for new construction substantial improvement activities shall be the elevation of the FFRMS floodplain. Any elevation requirements must be documented Elevation Certificate an or Floodproofing Certificate.

		The proposed undertakings, including rehabilitation, replacement, reconstruction, and elevation, are types of activities that have the potential to cause effects on historic properties. Therefore, a Section 106 review will be completed during the site-specific review.
		GA DCA has adopted a streamlined process for the Section 106 review of CDBG-DR projects. GA DCA is a signatory to a programmatic agreement (PA) through an executed Addendum, allowing certain activities to be exempt from further Section 106 review. Public Outreach [24 CFR 50.23 & 58.43]:

An Early Floodplain Public Notice was published July 2, 2025, and no comments were received during the 15-day public comment period. A combined Final Floodplain, Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI), and Notice of Intent to Request Release for Funds (NOI-RROF) public notice will be published prior to submitting the Request to Release of Funds (RROF) to HUD.

Cumulative Impact Analysis [24 CFR 58.32]:

The proposed program activities include rehabilitation, replacement, reconstruction, and elevation, as required. Any additional activities—such as new construction or relocation—that are not covered under this Broad-Level Tier I review will be evaluated on a site-specific basis through a Categorical Exclusion Subject to § 58.5 (CEST) or an Environmental Assessment (EA) review, as appropriate. These potential additional activities will continue to support the program's overall goal of facilitating long-term recovery and enhancing resilience to future storm events. Therefore, no significant cumulative impacts are anticipated from activities outside the scope of this Tier I review.

Alternatives [24 CFR 58.40(e); 40 CFR 1508.9]

The relocation of applicants with substantially damaged dwellings in the FFRMS floodplain to new locations outside of the floodplain is impractical and not a viable alternative. This alternative would require households to move without increasing affordable housing stock resulting in an increase in demand and housing costs, potential relocation outside of their communities which can have local economic and social impacts, and cost-prohibitive relocation and floodplain restoration costs.

No Action Alternative [24 CFR 58.40(e)]:

Applicants who cannot find other funding options to restore their homes or relocate might elect to remain in their homes and be subject to unsafe living conditions. The damaged structures would continue to deteriorate and remain vulnerable to future storms and flooding. As a result, these single-family homeowners may not be able to recover from the January 2023 Tornadoes which has additional adverse impacts on the community. Thus, the No Action Alternative would not meet the individual and community need for safe housing, nor would it provide resiliency measures including elevation. Therefore, this alternative is not feasible in relation to the desired objective to provide assistance to single-family homes, including MHUs, with unmet recovery needs from damages sustained during the January 2023 Tornadoes while increasing resiliency and reducing future loss of life and property in storm and flood-prone areas.

Summary of Findings and Conclusions:

This Broad-Level Tier I Environmental Assessment, including Determinations and Compliance Findings for HUD-assisted Projects under 24 CFR Part 58, concludes that the proposed program activities will comply with applicable regulations and will not result in any adverse environmental impacts.

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

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

Georgia Coastal Management Program

It is the mission of the Georgia Coastal Management Program (GCMP) to balance economic development in Georgia's coastal zone with preservation of natural, environmental, historic, archeological, and recreational resources for the benefit of Georgia's present and future generations. The GCMP offers technical assistance to local governments, property owners, developers, and the public to provide expertise on coastal issues, minimize environmental impacts, clarify regulatory requirements, and identify agency contacts. GCMP provides information on Best Management Practices and technical guidance on planning and design as well as information on habitat and endangered species. GCMP serves as a liaison among various agencies and institutions and maintains a list of contacts. GCMP provides forums for local governments, developers, and citizens to discuss potential resource issues and permit requirements with the appropriate agencies. The goals of GCMP Coastal Specialists are to promote sustainable development, to work with local governments to address natural resource issues, and to create a central source of information on coastal management issues.


The GCMP service area includes the eleven coastal counties of Brantley, Bryan, Camden, Charlton, Chatham, Effingham, Glynn, Liberty, Long, McIntosh, and Wayne. Including each of these eleven counties in the Management Program ensures that all of Georgia's coastal population, industry, and resources are addressed. Using county boundaries also simplifies the relationship with local governments and ensures that other programs and agencies in the coastal network can relate to the coastal service area boundaries

The Coastal and Ocean Management Program (COMP) administers the non-regulatory functions of the Coastal Management Program. Its functions include program and grant administration, technical assistance to local governments, outreach and education, facilitation of stakeholder processes, coastal water quality monitoring for beaches and shellfish, and implementation of the Coastal Incentive Grant Program which passes through nearly \$1 million annually for local projects and coastal research. The COMP is also the States' lead for the Coastal and Estuarine Land Conservation Program.



The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) is the lead Federal agency charged with the protection and conservation of Federal Trust Resources, including threatened and endangered species and migratory birds, in accordance with section 7 of the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended (ESA) (87 Stat. 884; 16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.), the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act, (16 U.S.C. 668-668d) (Eagle Act), and the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (40 Stat. 755; 16 U.S.C. 701 et seq.).

Many Federal agencies have active programs that result in an increased consumer demand to initiate projects through federally-backed loans and grants, all of which require those same Federal agencies or their designees to comply with Section 7 of the ESA. As a result, there has been an increase in the number of requests for review of these government-backed loan and grant projects. These include, but are not limited to:

- 1. U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Neighborhood Stabilization and Community Development Block Grant programs;
- 2. U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE) Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy program;
- 3. U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Housing Assistance and Rural Development Loan and Grant Assistance programs;
- 4. U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulatory airport and runway modifications:
- 5. U.S. Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Hazard Mitigation Assistance program; and
- 6. U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Clean Water State Revolving Fund.
- 7. U.S. Department of Commerce's (DOC) National Telecommunications and Information Administration Broadband Grant programs

In order to fulfill the ESA's statutory obligations in a timely and consistent manner, and to assist Federal agencies, State and local governments, and consultants in addressing Section 7 of the ESA and National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) environmental impact review requirements, we provide the following guidance and clearance relative to the criteria stated below for federally insured loan and grant project requests. This guidance applies to projects in all cities and unincorporated areas within the jurisdiction of participating Service field offices¹. Participating field offices are included in Attachment A and may include additional requirements or exclusions.

^{1.} While the Florida Ecological Services Field Office is a participating field office, the following guidance and clearance relative to the criteria stated below for federally insured loan and grant project requests is applicable in all cities and unincorporated areas throughout Florida, with the *exception* of **Monroe County**. Projects occurring within Monroe County, Florida should contact the Florida Ecological Services Vero Beach Branch Office for additional assistance.

Species Lists:

To acquire an official species list for the area where the project is proposed, please access the Information for Planning and Conservation (IPaC) website (https://ipac.ecosphere.fws.gov/). After defining a project, a user can "Start Review" and request an "Official Species List" of the project action area. The "Official Species List" report contains a list of federally listed threatened and endangered species, critical habitats, migratory birds, wildlife refuges, fish hatcheries, and/or wetlands located in the project footprint, and can help identify trust resources in the general area of the subject property. The "Official Species List" will generate a unique Project Code that should be included in any correspondence associated with the respective project.

Description of Projects Covered:

- 1. Any federally-insured loan or grant request for existing commercial, industrial, and residential structures (including multi-family and single-family housing), and various utilities projects (including, but not limited to, demolition, rehabilitation, renovations, and/or rebuilding of various utility and infrastructure projects such as water and wastewater treatment facilities, sewer or power line repair, telecommunications upgrades, etc.), provided:
 - a. The proposed project can be completed without additional clearing of undeveloped areas (e.g., native habitat, agricultural areas, pasture, etc.) beyond the original footprint of the existing project in order to complete the action request;
 - b. There are no federally endangered or threatened species using the existing structures or within the project area;
 - c. The project is not within designated critical habitat (DCH) for any federally listed species (by rule, DCH does not include already developed parcels); and
 - d. Specific Service field office requirements and exclusions are met for the state within which the project is located (Attachment A).
- 2. Any Federal loan transfer where the original lending or mortgage institutions for existing projects are no longer holding the loans and the properties are being transferred via federally-backed loans.
- 3. Any federally-insured loan or grant for the purchase of new equipment or vehicles.

Clearance to Proceed – The Service believes these types of activities will generally have no effect on species protected under the ESA, based on the criteria referenced above. Therefore, for ALL projects that meet the criteria described above, NO further coordination with the Service is necessary. Use this letter to document your consideration of endangered species and bald eagles.

Additional Considerations for non-federally listed species:

Bald Eagles: If any of the above-referenced activities (rehabilitation, demolition, or rebuilding) are proposed to occur within 660 feet of an active or alternate bald eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*) nest during the nesting season (October 1 through May 15), we recommend the applicant or their designated agent coordinate with the agency responsible for managing wildlife in their state. Migratory Birds: If any native birds are using the structures for nesting, actions should be taken to avoid disturbing adults, nests, eggs, or chicks as this could lead to a potential violation of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. If nests are present or any birds are using the structures regularly for roosting purposes, we recommend the applicant or their designated agent coordinate with the Service's Field Office and visit the Service's Migratory Bird Program website at https://www.fws.gov/library/collections/avoiding-and-minimizing-incidental-take-migratory-birds for recommendations on how impacts can be avoided and minimized.

For projects that do not meet the criteria specified above, and/or meet any of the following conditions, please contact the appropriate Service office for additional assistance:

- 1. The project occurs within designated critical habitat;
- 2. The project involves new construction;
- 3. The project requires disturbance of undeveloped areas; and/or
- 4. The project is in close proximity to federally listed species, bald eagle nests, and/or migratory bird roosts.

Reinitiation of consultation may be necessary if: (1) the project is modified in a manner not considered by this assessment; (2) a new species is listed or critical habitat is determined that may be affected by the project; or (3) new information indicates that the project may affect listed species or critical habitat in a manner not previously considered.

FEDERALLY-LISTED SPECIES AND DESIGNATED CRITICAL HABITAT

FOR INFORMATION ON BALD AND GOLDEN EAGLE MANAGEMENT GUIDELINES, WE RECOMMEND YOU REVIEW INFORMATION PROVIDED AT THE SERVICE'S BALD AND GOLDEN EAGLE MANAGEMENT LIBRARY COLLECTION.

NATIVE BATS

IF YOUR SPECIES LIST INCLUDES INDIANA BAT (MYOTIS SODALIS), NORTHERN LONG-EARED BAT (M. SEPTENTRIONALIS), OR TRICOLORED BAT (PERIMYOTIS SUBFLAVUS) AND THE PROJECT IS EXPECTED TO IMPACT FORESTED HABITAT, TREE CLEARING SHOULD OCCUR OUTSIDE OF THE PERIODS WHEN BATS MAY BE PRESENT AND MOST VULNERABLE. PUPS ARE INCAPABLE OF FLIGHT AND VULNERABLE TO DISTURBANCE FROM THE SPRING TO SUMMER. OUR RECOMMENDED SEASONAL CLEARING RESTRICTION WINDOWS DEPEND ON SPECIES AND REGION IN GEORGIA. PLEASE REACH OUT TO US FOR GUIDANCE.

INDIANA, NORTHERN LONG-EARED, TRICOLORED, AND GRAY (*M. GRISESCENS*) BATS ARE ALL KNOWN TO UTILIZE BRIDGES AND CULVERTS IN GEORGIA. IF YOUR PROJECT INCLUDES MAINTENANCE, CONSTRUCTION, OR ANY OTHER MODIFICATION OR DEMOLITION TO TRANSPORTATION STRUCTURES, A QUALIFIED INDIVIDUAL SHOULD COMPLETE A SURVEY OF THESE STRUCTURES FOR BATS AND SUBMIT YOUR FINDINGS VIA THE

AS IT IS A CANDIDATE FOR LISTING, THE SERVICE WELCOMES CONSERVATION MEASURES FOR THIS SPECIES. RECOMMENDED, AND VOLUNTARY, CONSERVATION MEASURES FOR PROJECTS IN GEORGIA CAN BE FOUND AT THE MONARCH CONSERVATION IN GEORGIA PAGE.

EASTERN INDIGO SNAKE

OUR OFFICE HAS PUBLISHED GUIDANCE DOCUMENTS TO ASSIST PROJECT PROPONENTS IN AVOIDING AND MINIMIZING POTENTIAL IMPACT TO THE EASTERN INDIGO SNAKE. THE VISUAL ENCOUNTER SURVEY PROTOCOL FOR THE EASTERN INDIGO SNAKE (DRYMARCHON COUPER!) Early Notice and Public Review of a Proposed Activity in a Federal Flood Risk Management Standard Designated Floodplain – 2023 Tornadoes

To: All interested Agencies, Groups and Individuals

This is to give notice that the Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) under 24 CFR Part 58 has determined that the following proposed actions under U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) Grant B-23-DG-13-0001 may be located in the Federal Flood Risk Management Standard (FFRMS) and DCA will be identifying and evaluating practicable alternatives to locating these actions within the floodplain and the potential impacts on the floodplain from the proposed actions, as required by Executive Order (EO) 11988, as previously amended by EO 13690, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 in Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management and Protection of Wetlands.

DCA proposes to use HUD CDBG-DR funds for eligible activities under the DCA January 2023 Tornadoes HRRP Single-Family Homeowner Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Program (HRRP), which addresses storm-damaged, single-family homes (residential structures and manufactured home units). The proposed activities include rehabilitation, demolition and reconstruction, and/or elevation of single-family homes damaged by the January 2023 Tornadoes (DR-4685) within Spalding County. The specific addresses of the single-family homes are unknown at this time because the participating property owner identification process is ongoing. Therefore, under 24 CFR Part 58.15 (Tiering) and 24 CFR Part 58.32 (Project Aggregation), DCA will use a tiered approach. Tier 2 site-specific reviews will be completed for those laws and authorities not addressed in the Tier 1 broad review for each address under this Program when addresses become known. No physical work will begin on a property until all levels of environmental review are complete and found to be in compliance.

While the specific addresses of the single-family homes are unknown at this time, the HRRP is expected to serve approximately 40 households. It is anticipated that some applicant homes will be located within the floodplain, as Spalding County contains Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHAs). The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs), available at FEMA Flood Map Service Center, will be used to determine whether each structure and parcel is located in a SFHA and floodway. The extent of the FFRMS floodplain for each specific address will be determined at the Tier 2 site-specific review level by using the best available data including the Climate-Informed Science Approach (CISA), the 0.2 percent flood approach (500-year floodplain), and/or the freeboard value approach (FVA). Since the proposed actions consist of rehabilitation, demolition and reconstruction, and/or elevation of existing single-family homes with no substantial change to the original footprint, there are no new adverse impacts anticipated to the existing natural and beneficial functions and intrinsic values of the floodplain. Floodplains are beneficial by providing natural moderation of floods, surface water quality maintenance, groundwater recharge, diverse wildlife habitat, cultural resources (archaeological, historic, and recreational), and agricultural, aquacultural, and forestry resources. The proposed actions will be completed in accordance with all applicable best management practices (BMPs) and federal, State, and local laws, regulations, and permit requirements and conditions including a local Floodplain Development Permit. Single-family homes constructed or substantially improved using HUD CDBG-DR funding are required to demonstrate compliance with the elevation mitigation requirements of 24 CFR 55.20(e) when the structure is located within the FFRMS floodplain. Structures located partially or wholly within the 100-year floodplain will be required to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program.

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplain and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Commenters are encouraged to offer alternative sites outside of the floodplain, alternative methods to serve the same project purpose, and methods to minimize and mitigate project impacts on the floodplain. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public educational tool. The dissemination of information and request for public comment about floodplain can facilitate and enhance Federal efforts to reduce the risks and impacts associated with the occupancy and modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the Federal government determines it will participate in actions taking place in floodplain, it must inform those who may be put at greater or continued risk.

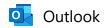



EO 11988 and EO 13690 Floodplain Management Determination Georgia Department of Community Affairs – January 2023 Tornadoes Homeowners Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Program

Introduction & Overview

The purpose of Executive Order (EO) 11988 Floodplain Management is "to avoid to the extent possible the long- and short-term adverse impacts associated with occupancy and modification of floodplains and to avoid direct or indirect support of floodplain development wherever there is a practicable alternative." This determination contains the analysis prescribed by 24 CFR Part 55 in conjunction with EO 11988 and EO 13690 Establishing a Federal Flood Risk Management Standard and a Process for Further Soliciting and Considering Stakeholder Input.

The 2023 Tornadoes brought devastating impacts to the State of Georgia, severely affecting homes, agriculture, and infrastructure. Georgia was subjected to strong winds and thunderstorms which resulted in an onslaught of as many as 14 tornadoes and led to widespread power outages across Metro Atlanta and Central Georgia. Subsequently, a Presidential declaration of a major disaster for the State of Georgia (FEMA-4685-DR) was issued January 16, 2023. On November 27, 2023, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced that the State of Georgia will receive \$12,595,000.00 in funding to support long-term recovery efforts following the 2023 Tornadoes through the Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA). The GA DCA as a HUD Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) recipient seeks to provide financial assistance to eligible applicants for housing (single-family and Manufactured Home Units (MHUs)) rehabilitation, housing demolition and reconstruction or MHU replacement, and elevation. Dwellings reconstructed or substantially improved using HUD CDBG-DR funding are required to demonstrate compliance with the elevation mitigation requirements of 24 CFR 55.20(e) when the structure is located within the FFRMS floodplain.

Based on the proposed activities, land use, necessity, and other case characteristics described herein, it is concluded that there is a reasonable basis to proceed with funding for this proposed action in a floodplain. The HUD CDBG-DR funding is administered through the GA DCA 2023 Tornadoes Homeowner Rehabilitation and Recovery Program (HRRP), which addresses eligible storm-damaged, single-family homes (single-family residential structures and MHUs). The HRRP will serve an estimated 40 households. Single-family homes and MHUs account for the majority of affected residential structures. Thus, alternatives preventing or impeding this objective are not considered reasonable alternatives.

Description of Proposed Action & Land Use

This EO 11988 and EO 13690 Floodplain Management Determination covers the proposed project area, referred to as the January 2023 Tornados, which is limited to the HUD-Identified MID Area, Spalding County, including all municipalities and rural areas therein.

The State of Georgia as a HUD CDBG-DR recipient seeks to provide financial assistance to eligible applicants for housing rehabilitation, demolition and reconstruction or MHU replacement, and elevation of single-family homes (residential structures and MHUs), and financial assistance regarding temporary relocation assistance damaged by the 2023 Tornadoes through the DCA – 2023 Tornadoes HRRP. All proposed activities will occur only to the dwelling identified in the application. The specific addresses of single-family homes to be included in these programs are unknown at this time because the owner identification and eligibility process is ongoing.

The anticipated programs and assistance to be provided under the GA DCA 2023 Tornadoes are presented below:

• Homeowner Rehabilitation and Recovery Program (HRRP) – addresses owner-occupied, single-family homes (residential structures and MHUs) that experienced damage from the 2023 Tornadoes. Each homeowner's single-family residential project may consist of one or more of the proposed project activities listed below.

Potential eligible activities discussed in this review include:

- 1. Single-family home repair/rehabilitation.
- 2. Single-family home reconstruction within the existing footprint or with no substantial change in footprint on the same parcel.
- 3. Manufactured Home Unit (MHU) repair/rehabilitation.
- 4. MHU replacement
- 5. MHU reconstruction with a single-family home (stick-built) with no substantial change in footprint on the same parcel.
- 6. Elevation as required under 24 CFR 55.20.

Please note that reconstruction activities include the demolition or removal of the existing damaged stick built home or MHU. Replacement activities include the demolition or removal of the existing damaged MHU.

Applications for the programs will be accepted during the application intake phase if the applicant's property was owned by the applicant at the time of the 2023 Tornadoes and suffered damage during the storm event dates. Before funds are released for specific project activities, each residential property must undergo a "Tier 2 Site-Specific Review" to ensure project compliance with 24 CFR 58, 24 CFR 55, related laws and regulations, and applicable HUD housing standards (e.g., Manufactured Home Construction and Safety Standards dated September 16, 2024, HUD CPD Green Building Retrofit Checklist, etc.).

The above programs are part of the overall GA DCA 2023 Tornadoes HRRP to address single-family homes damaged as a result of the 2023 Tornadoes while increasing resiliency. According to HUD Notice Federal Register-Vol.88_No.226_Monday November 27, 2023, the State of Georgia is allocated \$12,595,000.00 to address unmet recovery needs particularly in the most impacted and distressed (MID) areas from 2023 Tornadoes. The State of Georgia has submitted an Action Plan for HUD approval to identify the use of all CDBG-DR funding, including eligibility criteria for accessing the funds and how the proposed uses will address long-term recovery needs. The Action Plan for the 2023 Tornadoes disaster recovery describes programs and activities that conform to the applicable requirements as specified in the HUD Universal Notice CDBG-DR and Allocation Announcement Notice (AAN). The Action Plan cover the impacts of the qualifying disaster, restoration of housing, infrastructure, economic revitalization, and mitigation in the MID areas (see HUD Universal Notice CDBG-DR).

Applicable Regulatory Procedure Per EO 11988 and EO 13690.

The proposed action is a non-critical action involving dwellings not excluded under 24 CFR 55.8 *Limitations on HUD assistance in floodplains*. Funding is permissible for use in the floodplain if the proposed action is processed under §55.20 *Decision making process* and the findings of the determination are affirmative to suggest that the project may proceed. This proposed action involves housing rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, and elevation of single-family homes (residential structures and

MHUs) performed within the existing footprint or with no substantial change in footprint on the same parcel and are not expected to result in the new modification (direct or indirect impacts) of floodplains.

In accordance with 24 CFR 55, the proposed action involves housing rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, and elevation of single-family homes (residential structures and MHUs) damaged in the 2023 Tornadoes. According to the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Status Book (05/13/2025) Spalding County (130388B) is participating along with some municipalities. The City of Orchard Hill is not participating (**Appendix 1**). None of the communities in the 2023 Tornadoes have received public notice of suspension from NFIP (https://www.fema.gov/flood-insurance/work-with-nfip/community-status-book/public-notification). Substantial improvement/substantial damage calculations will be completed for proposed rehabilitation projects using the county tax assessor's or other available fair market value (FMV) and the estimated cost of repair (ECR) for each dwelling. Since the proposed action may involve activities located in the FFRMS floodplain, the full eight-step process in \$55.20 is required, and the following analysis examines each step in the EO 11988 and EO 13690 Floodplain Management Determination process.

Minor Improvements Inapplicability

Under 24 CFR 55.13 *Inapplicability of 8-step decision making process to certain categories of proposed actions*, section (b) includes "Financial assistance for minor repairs or improvements on one- to four-family properties that do not meet the thresholds for "substantial improvement" under §55.2(b)(12)."

Under 24 CFR 55.2(b)(12)(i), "Substantial improvement means either: (A) Any repair, reconstruction, modernization, or improvement of a structure, including a manufactured housing unit, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure either: (1) Before the improvement or repair is started; or (2) If the structure has been damaged, and is being restored, before the damage occurred; or (B) Any repair, reconstruction, modernization, or improvement of a structure, including a manufactured housing unit, that results in an increase of more than twenty percent in the number of dwelling units in a residential project or in the average peak number of customers and employees likely to be on-site at any one time for a commercial or industrial project." Under 24 CFR 55.2(b)(12)(iii), "Structural repairs, reconstruction, or improvements not meeting this definition are considered "minor improvements." At the Tier 2 Site-Specific Review level, proposed projects determined to qualify as *minor improvements* (does not meet the substantial improvement threshold of being equal to or exceeding 50 percent of the market value of the dwelling before the damage) based upon the dwelling's fair market value and estimated cost of repair do not require further evaluation under 24 CFR 55.20 per 24 CFR 55.13(b). While a structure might initially be eligible for rehabilitation activities, the damage might later be determined to necessitate full reconstruction and would be subject to the applicable requirements in 24 CFR 55.20.

Step 1. Determine Whether the Proposed Action is Located in the FFRMS floodplain.

At the Tier 2 Site-Specific Review level, the extent of the FFRMS floodplain will be determined on an individual basis using the Three-Tiered Approach to identifying the FFRMS floodplain which includes: 1) Climate-Informed Science Approach (CISA) map; 2) 500-year floodplain/ 0.2 percent floodplain approach (0.2PFA); or 3) freeboard value approach (FVA). Depending on the individual property, the effective FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) panel, Preliminary FIRM (PFIRM) panel (cannot be used if lower than the current FIRM base flood elevation [BFE]), where available, Federal Flood Standard Support Tool (FFSST), if available, and/or site elevations along with past history of flooding will be used to determine whether the dwelling is located in the FFRMS floodplain. There are no PFIRMs available at the FEMA Flood Map Service Center for Spalding County.

The dwelling must not be located within a FEMA-designated regulatory floodway (24 CFR 55.8[a][1]). For proposed projects with incidental floodway involving rehabilitation or reconstruction that does not expand or with no substantial change in footprint on the same parcel, the project activities would be allowed within the FFRMS floodplain outside of the floodway (24 CFR 55.8[a][1][ii]). Proposed project sites with an incidental portion in the FFRMS floodplain that do not include any buildings or improvements (except de minimis improvements) in the FFRMS floodplain are allowed to proceed if there is no new construction or modification of a wetland.

According to the FEMA FIRMs, there are Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs) located throughout the county (**Appendix 1**). Flood insurance is mandatory if any portion of the structure receiving HUD funding is located within a FEMA-designated SFHA and the total cost of repairs exceeds \$10,000. If flood insurance is not required, HUD still recommends that all insurable structures maintain flood insurance under the NFIP. If the proposed project activities only involve non-insurable improvements according to the NFIP Flood Insurance Manual effective April 1, 2024, then flood insurance is not required. However, federal, Tribal, State, and local laws and regulations related to both flood insurance and floodplain management must be followed, as applicable. The proposed action will be completed in accordance with all applicable best management practices (BMPs) and Federal, Tribal, State, and local laws, regulations, and permit requirements and conditions including a local Floodplain Development Permit, where applicable. This includes compliance with zoning, land use, and erosion and sediment control laws and regulations. Permits required for this proposed action shall be obtained before commencing work and appended to the applicant's *Tier 2 Site-Specific Environmental Review Record (ERR)* when received from the permitting agencies.

The full eight-step process in §55.20 is required for the proposed action, and the following analysis examines each step in an EO 11988 and EO 13690 Floodplain Management Determination process.

Step 2. Initiate Public Notice for Early Review of the Proposed Action.

Because the proposed action is located in FFRMS floodplain, GA DCA an posted an "Early Notice" and supporting documentation for public and agency viewing and input on the decision to provide funding for housing rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, and elevation activities under the Program. The Early Notice and corresponding 15-day public comment period started on July 1, 2025 with the "Early Notice and Public Review of a Proposed Activity in a Federal Flood Risk Management Standard Designated Floodplain" being posted to the GA DCA website at dca.georgia.gov, and the 15-day period expiring on July 18, 2025. The notice targeted local residents within the community, including those in the floodplain. The supporting documentation, incorporated by reference into the Early Notice, was posted for public review to the GA DCA website at dca.georgia.gov and included the effective FEMA FIRMs and the NFIP Community Status Book. In addition, the Early Notice and supporting documentation were made available for public and agency viewing at the GA DCA office. The Early Notice was sent via email to the following federal and State agencies on or before July 2, 2025: HUD GA Field Office; FEMA; U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS); and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE). (See Attachment 8 for the Early Notice distributed to these agencies, the proof of posting. and distribution documentation). The Early Notice's 15-day comment period is complete, and no substantive public comments were received.

Step 3. Identify and Evaluate Practicable Alternatives to Locating the Proposed Action in the FFRMS Floodplain.

The GA DCA 2023 Tornadoes HRRP seeks to provide financial assistance to eligible applicants for housing rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, and elevation. The proposed projects will occur on the same parcel and within the existing footprint or with no substantial change in footprint and are not expected to result in new modification (direct or indirect impacts) of floodplain.

Minimization and mitigation measures will be incorporated to ensure the least potential harm to or within the floodplain from the proposed project activities at each applicable site (see 24 CFR 55.20[e][2]). The project designs will be completed in accordance with public and agency input to minimize potential impacts to historic resources, the floodplain, environment, and community. All activities must be conducted in compliance with Federal, State, Tribal, and local laws, regulations, and permit requirements and conditions. Mitigation measures include BMPs such as native plants used for site restoration and silt fencing to prevent significant erosion from occurring and impacting water resources, project design preferred to be within the existing footprint, tree clearing avoided as much as feasible, resilient building codes and standards implemented, and proposed project activities completed in accordance with all applicable federal, Tribal, State, and local laws, regulations, and permit requirements and conditions. This includes compliance with zoning, land use, and erosion and sediment control laws and regulations. Under the Sedimentation Pollution Control Act of 1973, an erosion and sedimentation control plan will be required if one or more acres are to be disturbed. The plan must be filed with and approved by the applicable Land Quality Section Regional Office at least 30 days before beginning activity. In all instances of work in a SFHA, the local floodplain administrator will be contacted to ensure compliance and obtain a local floodplain development permit, as needed, prior to commencing any development activities proposed to be located within SFHA and Future Conditions Flood Hazard Areas. Permits required for proposed project activities shall be obtained before commencing work and appended to the Tier 2 Site-Specific ERR. Site-specific compliance and mitigation requirements including elevation and flood insurance will become a condition of federal assistance under the Program.

Relocation Outside of the Floodplain Alternative:

This alternative would require applicants with residential structures in the FFRMS floodplain that were substantially damaged by the 2023 Tornadoes to relocate outside of the floodplain. Homeowners would be relocated to new locations outside of the floodplain. Because this alternative would involve the mandatory mass relocation of households, it could result in an increase in housing demand and, subsequently, housing costs. Currently, there is an inadequate supply of safe, suitable affordable housing stock especially in disaster-declared communities, counties, and the region as a whole to accommodate the vast number of applicants looking for home relocation sites outside of the floodplain. This might result in many residents having to move out of their neighborhoods and communities, which could have local economic and social impacts.

Although this alternative safely relocates the applicants outside of the floodplain and restores the floodplain to its natural state, these benefits come at an additional cost. This alternative saves money by not elevating the dwellings, implementing flood mitigation measures, and paying for flood insurance. However, these savings are offset by costs associated with demolition, debris removal, construction, administration, the purchase price of the former home, temporary relocation assistance, and other requirements. The economic feasibility of mass relocations would likely not be practical given available funding limitations. Thus, the relocation of these homeowners outside of FFRMS floodplain is impractical and not a viable alternative.

Flood Protection Infrastructure Alternative:

Historically, flood protection infrastructure including drainage improvements, dams, and levees have been used as a community-based solution to increase resiliency and protect structures in a floodplain. These infrastructure projects have proven variably effective in protecting communities from flooding. However, these actions do not address the individual housing needs for the homeowners. Many homeowners do not have the resources to adequately address housing damage sustained during the 2023 Tornadoes. In the absence of CDBG-DR assistance, other funding options would be needed to restore their homes or relocate. The damaged structures would continue to deteriorate and remain vulnerable to future storms and flooding until the flood protection infrastructure is built. Unfortunately, flood protection infrastructure is costly and requires intensive planning, permitting and development. Further, it is less effective and feasible for individual residential projects on scattered sites. While flood protection infrastructure is usually eligible for CDBG-DR funding, levees and other flood protection infrastructure are prohibitively expensive on a homeby-home or small-scale basis. For these reasons, the flood protection infrastructure alternative is not adequately effective or practicable.

No Action Alternative [24 CFR 58.40(e)]:

With the No Action Alternative, CDBG-DR assistance would not be provided to these applicants whose homes incurred substantial damage during the 2023 Tornadoes. Many homeowners do not have the resources to adequately address housing damages sustained during the 2023 Tornadoes. In the absence of CDBG-DR assistance through this Program, they would need to find other funding options to restore their homes or relocate. Alternatively, applicants might elect to remain in their homes and be subject to unsafe living conditions. In addition, the damaged structures would continue to deteriorate and remain vulnerable to future storms and flooding. As a result, these single-family homeowners may not be able to recover from the 2023 Tornadoes which has additional adverse impacts on the community as a whole. Thus, the No Action Alternative would not meet the individual and community need for safe housing, nor would it provide resiliency measures including elevating dwellings and relocating eligible property owners to safer, less flood-prone locations. The CBDG-DR assistance through the 2023 Tornadoes would provide vital resources necessary to restore storm-damaged residential structures and return families to their homes, while incorporating mitigation measures to prevent further building deterioration, safeguard from future losses, and increase resiliency from future storm events. Therefore, the No Action Alternative is not feasible in relation to the desired objective to provide assistance to single-family homes with unmet recovery needs from damages sustained during 2023 Tornadoes while increasing resiliency and reducing future loss of life and property in storm and flood-prone areas.

The above-identified alternatives will be re-evaluated in response to any public comments received.

Step 4. Identify and Evaluate the Potential Direct and Indirect Impacts Associated with the Occupancy or Modification of the FFRMS Floodplain and the Potential Direct and Indirect Support of Floodplain Development that Could Result from Proposed Action, Including Impacts Related to Future Climate-Related Flood Levels, Sea Level Rise, and the Related Increased Value of Beneficial Floodplain Functions.

The floodplain evaluation for the proposed action must evaluate floodplain characteristics (both existing and as proposed for modification by the project) to determine potential adverse impacts to lives, property, and natural and beneficial floodplain values as compared with alternatives identified in **Step 3**. Natural and

beneficial values include consideration of potential for adverse impacts on water resources such as natural moderation of floods, water quality maintenance, and groundwater recharge, living resources such as flora and fauna, cultural resources (archaeological, historic, aesthetic and recreational aspects), and agricultural, aquacultural, and forestry resources.

Floodplain Characteristics under §55.20(d)(1)(i)

According to §55.20(d)(1)(i), floodplain characteristics include: (A) Identification of portions of the site that are subject to flood risk, documented through mapping and, as required by § 55.7(e) or commensurate with the scale of the project and available resources as permitted by § 55.7(f), climate-informed analysis of factors including development patterns, streamflow, and hydrologic and hydraulic modeling; (B) Topographic information that can inform flooding patterns and distance to flood sources, as described in flood mapping, Flood Insurance Studies, and other data sources; and (C) Public safety communications and data related to flood risk including available information on structures such as dams, levees, or other flood protection infrastructure located in proximity to the site. Depending on the individual property, the effective FEMA FIRM panel, PFIRM panel, where available, and/or FFSST FVA Report, if available, and/or site elevations along with past history of flooding will be used to determine whether the dwelling is located in the FFRMS floodplain. If available, topographic information such as Flood Insurance Studies (FIS) will be reviewed. Each applicant's property will be evaluated for dams, levees or other flood protection infrastructure located in proximity to the site.

Impacts to Lives and Property under §55.20(d)(1)(ii)

According to §55.20(d)(1)(ii), impacts to lives and property include: (A) Potential loss of life, injury, or hardship to residents of the subject property during a flood event; (B) Damage to the subject property during a flood event; (C) Damage to surrounding properties from increased runoff or reduction in floodplain function during a flood event due to modification of the subject site; (D) Health impacts due to exposure to toxic substance releases that may be caused or exacerbated by flood events; and (E) Damage to a community as a result of project failure (e.g., failure of stormwater management infrastructure due to scouring).

The overall purpose of the 2023 Tornadoes HRRP is to provide timely assistance for single-family homes, including MHUs, with unmet recovery needs from damages sustained during 2023 Tornadoes. It is highly likely that most homeowners, especially low- to moderate-income (LMI) households, do not have the resources to adequately address housing damages sustained during 2023 Tornadoes. In the absence of CDBG-DR assistance through this Program, they would need to find other funding options to restore their homes or relocate, resulting in hardship. The damaged structures would continue to deteriorate and remain vulnerable to future storms and flooding. The effects from not providing this critical funding to households would be detrimental to them and their communities.

The project designs will be completed in accordance with public and agency input to minimize potential impacts to historic resources, the floodplain, environment, and community. Mitigation measures include BMPs such as native plants used for site restoration and silt fencing, project design preferred to be within the existing footprint, tree clearing avoided as much as feasible, resilient building codes and standards implemented, and proposed project activities completed in accordance with all applicable federal, Tribal, State, and local laws, regulations, and permit requirements and conditions. This includes compliance with zoning, land use, and erosion and sediment control laws and regulations. In all instances of work in a SFHA, the local floodplain administrator will be contacted to ensure compliance and obtain a local floodplain development permit, as needed, prior to commencing any development activities proposed to be located within SFHA and Future Conditions Flood Hazard Areas. Site-specific compliance and mitigation

requirements including elevation and flood insurance will become a condition of federal assistance under the Program.

The proposed action will increase resiliency of these dwellings because elevation is required under 24 CFR 55.20(e) when it is located within the FFRMS floodplain. Site-specific compliance and mitigation requirements including elevation and flood insurance will become a condition of federal assistance under the Program. The CBDG-DR assistance would provide vital resources necessary to restore storm-damaged dwellings and return families to their homes, while incorporating mitigation measures to prevent further building deterioration, safeguard from future losses, and increase resiliency from future storm events. Thus, the proposed action ultimately decreases the potential for loss of life, injury, and hardship to the residents, future damage to the subject properties, and damage to surrounding properties.

Impacts to Floodplain Natural and Beneficial Values under §55.20(d)(1)(iii)

Water Resources - Natural Moderation of Floods, Water Quality Maintenance, and Groundwater Recharge under $\S55.20(d)(1)(iii)(A)$

Natural floodplains provide flood risk reduction benefits by slowing runoff and storing flood water and important functions for water quality maintenance and groundwater recharge. The HRRP aims to restore storm-damaged housing. Proposed projects involving rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, and elevation on the same parcel performed within the existing footprint or with no substantial increase are not expected to result in new modification (direct or indirect impacts) of floodplain. The dwelling must not be located within a FEMA-designated regulatory floodway (24 CFR 55.8[a][1]).

Minimization and mitigation measures will be incorporated to ensure the least potential harm to or within the floodplain from the proposed project activities at each applicable site (see 24 CFR 55.20[e][2]). The project designs will be completed in accordance with public and agency input to minimize potential impacts to historic resources, the floodplain, environment, and community. All activities must be conducted in compliance with Federal, State, Tribal, and Local Laws. Mitigation measures include BMPs such as native plants used for site restoration and silt fencing to prevent significant erosion from occurring and impacting water resources, project design preferred to be within the existing footprint or no substantial increase, tree clearing avoided as much as feasible, resilient building codes and standards implemented, and proposed project activities completed in accordance with all applicable federal, Tribal, State, and local laws, regulations, and permit requirements and conditions. This includes compliance with zoning, land use, and erosion and sediment control laws and regulations. Under the Sedimentation Pollution Control Act of 1973, an erosion and sedimentation control plan will be required if one or more acres are to be disturbed. The plan must be filed with and approved by the applicable Land Quality Section Regional Office at least 30 days before beginning activity. In all instances of work in a SFHA, the local floodplain administrator will be contacted to ensure compliance and obtain a local floodplain development permit, as needed, prior to commencing any development activities proposed to be located within SFHA and Future Conditions Flood Hazard Areas. Permits required for proposed project activities shall be obtained before commencing work and appended to the Tier 2 Site-Specific ERR. Site-specific compliance and mitigation requirements including elevation and flood insurance will become a condition of federal assistance under the Program. Based upon the project characteristics described above including mitigation measures and the type of land use, there are no new adverse impacts anticipated to water resources including natural moderation of floods, water quality maintenance, and groundwater recharge from the Program and its proposed projects.

Living Resources - Flora and Fauna under §55.20(d)(1)(iii)(B)

On July 11, 2024, the USFWS issued a "Clearance to Proceed with Federally-Insured Loan and Grant Project Requests" letter providing guidance and clearance for existing single-family housing. Under the section, Description of Projects Covered (page 2), the following types of activities will generally have No Effect on species protected under the ESA:

- a. The proposed project can be completed without additional clearing of undeveloped areas (e.g., native habitat, agricultural areas, pasture, etc.) beyond the original footprint of the existing project in order to complete the action request.
- b. There are no federally endangered or threatened species using the existing structures or within the project area.
- c. The project is not within designated critical habitat (DCH) for any federally listed species (by rule, DCH does not include already developed parcels).
- d. Specific Service field office requirements and exclusions are met for the state within which the project is located (Attachment A).

The proposed project involves the rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, and/or elevation of multiple existing residential dwellings through the county. All work will occur on the existing parcels and can be completed without additional clearing of undeveloped areas beyond the original footprint of the existing dwellings. The proposed activities are on developed land and do not contain suitable habitat for federally listed endangered or threatened species. The Service letter was signed by the Georgia Ecological Services Field Office, and there are no additional applicable exclusions or restrictions. Therefore, all conditions are met and no further coordination with the Service is required.

There are additional responsibilities under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) and the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (BGEPA) to protect native birds from project-related impacts. The following considerations listed on page 3 of the Clearance letter will be followed to avoid impacts to these non-federally listed species:

Bald Eagles: If any of the above-referenced activities (rehabilitation, reconstruction, and/or elevation) are proposed to occur within 660 feet of an active or alternate bald eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*) nest during the nesting season (October 1 through May 15), the applicant or their designated agent will coordinate with the agency responsible for managing wildlife in their state (Georgia Department of Natural Resources, Wildlife Resources Division).

Migratory Birds: If any native birds are using the structures for nesting, actions will be taken to avoid disturbing adults, nests, eggs, or chicks as this could lead to a potential violation of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. If nests are present or any birds are using the structures regularly for roosting purposes, the applicant or their designated agent will coordinate with the Service's Georgia Ecological Field Office and visit the Service's Migratory Bird Program website at https://www.fws.gov/library/collections/avoiding-and-minimizing-incidental-take-migratory-birds for recommendations on how impacts can be avoided and minimized.

Based upon the project characteristics and review procedures described above, there are no new adverse impacts anticipated to living resources (flora and fauna) from the HRRP and its proposed projects.

Cultural Resources - Archaeological, Historic, Aesthetic, and Recreational Aspects under $\S 55.20(d)(1)(iii)(C)$

GA DCA is a signatory to a programmatic agreement (PA) through an executed Addendum, to be used in determining Section 106 compliance at the Tier 2 Site-Specific Review level. The HRRP's compliance will be achieved at the Tier 2 Site-Specific Review level.

Tier 2 Site-Specific Review

The PA will determine the requisite process for the NHPA Section 106 review based upon the individual proposed project and site characteristics. The PA incorporates the three-step process established in the NHPA for (1) identifying whether historic properties will be affected by the proposed undertaking; (2) assessing the undertaking's effects on identified historic properties, and (3) engaging in consultation with stakeholders to avoid, reduce, or mitigate any adverse effect from the undertaking. The Tier I Allowances in the PA specify which proposed projects are determined to have no effect on historic properties and not require SHPO consultation. The Tier II Allowances in the PA specify which proposed projects will have a limited effect on historic properties as determined through Secretary of Interior (SOI)-qualified staff review. Proposed projects not meeting a Tier I or II Allowance will require SHPO and other applicable stakeholder consultation. The consultation process for these projects will be set forth in the PA, as well as the process for resolving Adverse Effects.

Proposed projects involving ground disturbance will require consultation with the applicable Tribes, Nations and Communities identified using the HUD Tribal Directory Assessment Tool (TDAT) to discuss the presence of historic properties with religious and cultural significance in the proposed project area. In addition, HUD's When to Consult with Tribes under Section 106 form is to be utilized when applicable. In the event of any inadvertent discoveries of human remains and/or cultural resources including, but not limited to, funerary objects, sacred objects and objects of cultural patrimony are made during execution of the project scope, then work shall be halted immediately and the SHPO and THPO of all appropriate Tribes, Nations and Communities shall be consulted before work can be resumed.

The Tier 2 Site-Specific ERR will contain the compliance determination and requisite documentation which could include, but is not limited to, an individual Tier I or II Allowance Memorandum, Memorandum of Agreement, GA SHPO/ THPO(s)/ other stakeholder (e.g., historic district commission) correspondence and response(s), and/or signed When to Consult with Tribes form. Documentation shall meet the requirements outlined in the NHPA and PA including, but not limited to, SOI-qualified staff review, as applicable.

The HRRP and its proposed project activities will allow most applicants to remain in their current existing homes and relocate some applicants preferably within their communities. The HRRP will provide assistance for housing rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, and elevation of single-family homes, including MHUs, on existing residential parcels. Based upon the project characteristics and review procedures described above, there are no new adverse impacts anticipated to cultural resources (archaeological, historic, aesthetic, and recreational aspects) from the HRRP and its proposed project activities.

Agricultural, Aquacultural, and Forestry Resources under §55.20(d)(1)(iii)(D)

The proposed action's activities involving rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, and elevation on the same parcel do *not* involve acquisition of undeveloped land or conversion of land from one use to another and will not convert farmland to non-agricultural use. Thus, the proposed action is not expected to have an impact on agricultural, aquacultural or forestry resources.

Step 5. Where Practicable, Design or Modify the Proposed Action to Minimize the Potential Adverse Impacts to and from the FFRMS Floodplain and to Restore and Preserve its Natural and Beneficial Functions and Values.

Floodplains are beneficial by providing natural moderation of floods, surface water quality maintenance, groundwater recharge, diverse wildlife habitat, cultural resources (archaeological, historic, and recreational), and agricultural, aquacultural, and forestry resources. The HRRP aims to restore storm-damaged housing. The proposed projects involve rehabilitation, reconstruction, replacement, and elevation on the same parcel performed within the existing footprint or with no substantial change in footprint and are not expected to result in new modification (direct or indirect impacts) of the floodplain. The dwelling must not be located within a FEMA-designated regulatory floodway (24 CFR 55.8[a][1]). For proposed projects with incidental floodway involving rehabilitation or reconstruction that does not expand the footprint the project activities would be allowed within the FFRMS floodplain outside of the floodway (24 CFR 55.8[a][1][ii]). Proposed project sites with an incidental portion in the FFRMS floodplain that do not include any buildings or improvements (except de minimis improvements) in the FFRMS floodplain are allowed to proceed if there is no new construction in wetland.

Dwellings constructed or substantially improved using HUD CDBG-DR funding are required to demonstrate compliance with the elevation mitigation requirements of 24 CFR 55.20(e) when the structure is located within the FFRMS floodplain. For dwellings in the FFRMS floodplain, the required elevation must be documented on an Elevation Certificate or a Floodproofing Certificate in the Tier 2 Site-Specific ERR prior to construction. Unless required otherwise, the minimum elevation or floodproofing requirement for new construction or substantial improvement actions shall be the elevation of the FFRMS floodplain as defined in 24 CFR 55.20(e). If a dwelling undergoing new construction or substantial improvement is located in the FFRMS floodplain, the lowest floor or FEMA-approved equivalent must be designed using the elevation of the FFRMS floodplain as the baseline standard for elevation, except where higher elevations are required by Tribal, State, or locally adopted code or standards, in which case higher elevations apply. Where non-elevation standards such as setbacks or other flood risk reduction standards are required by Tribal, State, or locally adopted code or standards, those standards shall apply in addition to the FFRMS baseline elevation standard (24 CFR 55.20[e][1][i]). New construction and substantial improvement of residential structures that have no dwelling units below the FFRMS floodplain shall be designed either: (A) With the lowest floor, including basement, elevated to or above the elevation of the FFRMS floodplain; or (B) With the structure floodproofed at least up to the elevation of the FFRMS floodplain. Floodproofing standards are as stated in FEMA's guidance and regulations at 44 CFR 60.3(c)(3)(ii) and (c)(4)(i), or as updated, except where the standard refers to base flood level, floodproofing is required at or above the FFRMS floodplain (24 CFR 55.20[e][1][ii]). The term "lowest floor" must be applied consistent with FEMA regulations in 44 CFR 59.1 and FEMA's Elevation Certificate guidance or other applicable current FEMA guidance.

In addition, minimization and mitigation measures will be incorporated to ensure the least potential harm to or within the floodplain from the proposed project activities at each applicable site (*see* 24 CFR 55.20[e][2]). The project designs will be completed in accordance with public and agency input to minimize potential impacts to historic resources, the floodplain, environment, and community. All activities must be conducted in compliance with Federal, State, Tribal, and local laws. Mitigation measures include BMPs such as native plants used for site restoration and silt fencing to prevent significant erosion from occurring and impacting water resources, project design preferred to be within the existing footprint or with no substantial change in footprint, tree clearing avoided as much as feasible, resilient building codes and standards implemented, and proposed project activities completed in accordance with all applicable federal, Tribal, State, and local laws, regulations, and permit requirements and conditions. This includes compliance with zoning, land use, and erosion and sediment control laws and regulations. Under the Sedimentation

Pollution Control Act of 1973, an erosion and sedimentation control plan will be required if one or more acres are to be disturbed. The plan must be filed with and approved by the applicable Land Quality Section Regional Office at least 30 days before beginning activity. In all instances of work in a SFHA, the local floodplain administrator will be contacted to ensure compliance and obtain a local floodplain development permit, as needed, prior to commencing any development activities proposed to be located within SFHA and Future Conditions Flood Hazard Areas. Permits required for proposed project activities shall be obtained before commencing work and appended to the *Tier 2 Site-Specific ERR*. Site-specific compliance and mitigation requirements including elevation and flood insurance will become a condition of federal assistance under the HRRP.

Based upon the project characteristics described above, limitations on funding, and type of land use, there are no new adverse impacts anticipated to the existing natural and beneficial functions and intrinsic values of the floodplain.

Step 6. Reevaluate the Alternatives and Proposed Action in the Totality of the Previous Steps and this Section's Criteria.

Three alternatives to the proposed action were identified. The relocation of applicants with substantially damaged dwellings in the FFRMS floodplain to new locations outside of the floodplain is impractical and not a viable alternative. This alternative would require households to move without increasing affordable housing stock resulting in an increase in demand and housing costs, potential relocation outside of their communities which can have local economic and social impacts, and cost-prohibitive relocation and floodplain restoration costs. The flood protection infrastructure alternative is not adequately effective or practicable since it is a community-based solution that does not address the individual housing needs for the homeowners. In the absence of CDBG-DR assistance, other funding options would be needed to restore their homes or relocate. The damaged structures would continue to deteriorate and remain vulnerable to future storms and flooding until the flood protection infrastructure is built which is costly and requires intensive planning. The main alternative is the No Action Alternative. Applicants who cannot find other funding options to restore their homes or relocate might elect to remain in their homes and be subject to unsafe living conditions. The damaged structures would continue to deteriorate and remain vulnerable to future storms and flooding. As a result, these single-family homeowners may not be able to recover from the 2023 Tornadoes which has additional adverse impacts on the community. Thus, the No Action Alternative would not meet the individual and community need for safe housing, nor would it provide resiliency measures including elevation and relocation of eligible property owners to safer, less flood-prone locations. Therefore, this alternative is not feasible in relation to the desired objective to provide assistance to single-family homes, including MHUs, with unmet recovery needs from damages sustained during the 2023 Tornadoes while increasing resiliency and reducing future loss of life and property in storm and floodprone areas.

The overall purpose of the GA DCA 2023 Tornadoes Program is to provide timely assistance for single-family homes, including MHUs, with unmet recovery needs from the damages sustained during the 2023 Tornadoes. It is highly likely that most homeowners, especially LMI households, do not have the resources to adequately address housing damages sustained during the 2023 Tornadoes. In the absence of CDBG-DR assistance through the HRRP, they would need to find other funding options to restore their homes or relocate. The damaged structures would continue to deteriorate and remain vulnerable to future storms and flooding. The CBDG-DR assistance through the GA DCA 2023 Tornadoes would provide vital resources necessary to restore storm-damaged dwellings and return families to their homes, while incorporating mitigation measures to prevent further building deterioration, safeguard from future losses, and increase resiliency from future storm events. The effects from not providing this critical funding to households would be detrimental to them and their communities. The proposed action is still practicable in light of potential impacts on the floodplain reviewed in this EO 11988 and EO 13690 Floodplain Management Determination.

Implementation of the proposed action includes the project designs being completed in accordance with public and agency input to minimize potential impacts to historic resources, the floodplain, environment, and community. All activities must be conducted in compliance with Federal, State, Tribal, and local laws. Mitigation measures include BMPs such as native plants used for site restoration and silt fencing to prevent significant erosion from occurring and impacting water resources, project design preferred to be within the existing footprint or with no substantial change in footprint, tree clearing avoided as much as feasible, resilient building codes and standards implemented, and proposed project activities completed in accordance with all applicable federal, Tribal, State, and local laws, regulations, and permit requirements and conditions. This includes compliance with zoning, land use, and erosion and sediment control laws and regulations, Under the Sedimentation Pollution Control Act of 1973, an erosion and sedimentation control plan will be required if one or more acres are to be disturbed. The plan must be filed with and approved by the applicable Land Quality Section Regional Office at least 30 days before beginning activity. In all instances of work in a SFHA, the local floodplain administrator will be contacted to ensure compliance and obtain a local floodplain development permit, as needed, prior to commencing any development activities proposed to be located within SFHA and Future Conditions Flood Hazard Areas. Permits required for proposed project activities shall be obtained before commencing work and appended to the Tier 2 Site-Specific Review. Site-specific compliance and mitigation requirements including elevation and flood insurance will become a condition of federal assistance under the Program.

The impacts of these alternatives will be re-evaluated in response to any public comments received.

Step 7. Issue Findings and Public Explanation in Final Notice.


The EO 11988 and EO 13690 Floodplain Management Determination analyzed the long- and short-term impacts associated with the continued occupancy and/or modification of the floodplain and considered whether there were any practicable alternatives to providing CDBG-DR assistance in the floodplain. It is the finding of this EO 11988 and EO 13690 Floodplain Management Determination that there is no practicable alternative than to provide CDBG-DR funding for the proposed action to address storm-damaged housing and increase resiliency from future storm damage.

A "Final Notice" formally known as the "Final Notice and Public Explanation of a Proposed Activity in a Federal Flood Risk Management Standard Designated Floodplain" will be posted in accordance with 24 CFR 55 and appended to the Tier 2 Site-Specific Review. The Final Notice will be combined with the FONSI and NOI-RROF notice. The 15-day comment period will start with the notice being posted to the GA DCA website at <u>dca.georgia.gov</u>. The notice and supporting documentation will be made available for public and agency viewing and input on the decision to provide funding for the proposed action at the GA DCA office and sent via email to the following federal and State agencies: HUD GA Field Office; FEMA; USFWS; USACE; EPA.

Supporting documentation, including this EO 11988 and EO 13690 Floodplain Management Determination, incorporated into the Final Notice will be made available for public review at the GA DCA office. Any substantive comments received will be addressed, and incorporated into the ERRs prior to proceeding with the submission of a request for release of funds.

Step 8. Implementation and Continuing Responsibility of the Responsible Entity and Recipient to Ensure that the Mitigating Measures identified in Step 7 are Implemented.

The Responsible Entity will provide educational materials, when available. It is acknowledged there is continuing responsibility by the Responsible Entity to ensure, to the extent feasible and necessary, compliance with the Steps herein.

No. 93-288 (1974) (codified as amended at 42 U.S.C. § 5121 et seq., (Stafford Act); the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968, Pub. L. No. 90-448 (1968) (as amended); the National Flood Insurance Reform Act of 1994, Pub. L. No. 103-325 (1994) (as amended); the Post-Katrina Emergency Management Reform Act of 2006, Pub. L. No. 109-295 (2006) (as amended); implementing regulations contained in Title 44 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Executive Order 13407 (2006), and such other acts, executive orders, implementing regulations, or Congressionally authorized programs as are enacted from time to time; and

WHEREAS, FEMA also may directly perform its own Undertakings pursuant to this Agreement; and

 WHEREAS, in anticipation or in the immediate aftermath of an event, impacted communities and the State of Georgia, and/or affected Tribes, may conduct critical preparedness, response and recovery activities to safeguard public health and safety and to restore vital community services and functions before, during, and or following an event. Some of these activities may become Undertakings requiring Section 106 review subject to the terms of this Agreement, and FEMA shall coordinate the appropriate review as warranted; and

WHEREAS, FEMA has determined that its Programs may result in Undertakings with the potential to affect historic properties having religious and cultural significance to Tribes, including sites that may contain human remains and/or associated cultural items; and

 WHEREAS, FEMA recognizes that the Absentee-Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Alabama Coushatta Tribe of Texas, Alabama-Quassarte Tribal Town of the Creek Nation, Catawba Indian Nation of Oklahoma, Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana, Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, Eastern-Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Kialegee Tribal Town, Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians, Muscogee (Creek) Nation, Poarch Band of Creek Indians, Seminole Nation of Oklahoma, Seminole Tribe of Florida, Shawnee Tribe, and United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians may have sites and land of religious and cultural significance within the State of Georgia, and in meeting its Federal trust responsibility pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.2 (c)(2)(ii) has invited the Tribes to enter into a separate agreement that specifies how FEMA and the Tribes will carry out Section 106 responsibilities, including the confidentiality of information. The agreement may grant the Tribes additional rights to participate or concur in FEMA decisions in the Section 106 process beyond those specified in Subpart B of 36 CFR Part 800; and

WHEREAS, FEMA recognizes that the Absentee-Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Alabama Coushatta Tribe of Texas, Alabama-Quassarte Tribal Town of the Creek Nation, Catawba Indian Nation of Oklahoma, Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana, Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, Eastern-Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Kialegee Tribal Town, Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians, Muscogee (Creek) Nation, Poarch Band of Creek Indians, Seminole Nation of Oklahoma, Seminole Tribe of Florida, Shawnee Tribe, and United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians may have sites of religious and cultural significance on or off Tribal lands, and in meeting its Federal trust responsibility, FEMA has engaged in government-to-government

consultation with the Tribes, and pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.2 (c)(2)(ii)(E) has invited the Tribes to enter into an agreement that specifies how FEMA and the Tribes will carry out Section 106 responsibilities, including the confidentiality of information; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the aforementioned invitation to enter into a separate agreement, FEMA has invited the Absentee-Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Alabama Coushatta Tribe of Texas, Alabama-Quassarte Tribal Town of the Creek Nation, Catawba Indian Nation of Oklahoma, Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana, Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, Eastern-Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Kialegee Tribal Town, Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians, Muscogee (Creek) Nation, Poarch Band of Creek Indians, Seminole Nation of Oklahoma, Seminole Tribe of Florida, Shawnee Tribe, and United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians to enter into this Agreement as an invited signatory party to fulfill the requirements of Section 106; and

WHEREAS, noTribes(s) have agreed to enter into a separate Programmatic Agreement or other agreement with FEMA; and

WHEREAS, the Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians Tribes have declined to enter into this Agreement as a signatory party; and

WHEREAS, Absentee-Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Alabama Coushatta Tribe of Texas, Alabama-Quassarte Tribal Town of the Creek Nation, Catawba Indian Nation of Oklahoma, Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana, Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, Eastern-Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Kialegee Tribal Town, Muscogee (Creek) Nation, Poarch Band of Creek Indians, Seminole Nation of Oklahoma, Seminole Tribe of Florida, and the Shawnee Tribe have not responded to FEMA's invitation to enter into this Agreement as a signatory party; and

 WHEREAS, FEMA may invite additional Tribes that have sites of religious and cultural significance to enter into the terms of this Agreement as invited signatories or concurring parties in accordance with 36 CFR §800.14(f), and nothing in this Agreement prevents a Tribe from entering into a separate Programmatic Agreement or other agreement with FEMA for the administration of FEMA Programs; and

WHEREAS, for specific Undertakings, FEMA may invite other agencies, organizations, and individuals to participate as consulting parties; and

 NOW, THEREFORE, FEMA, the Grantee(s), SHPO, and participating Tribe(s) (Signatories) agree that FEMA Programs in the State of Georgia shall be administered in accordance with the following Stipulations to satisfy FEMA's Section 106 responsibilities for all resulting Undertakings and effectively integrate historic preservation compliance considerations into the delivery of FEMA assistance. FEMA will not authorize implementation of an individual Undertaking until Section 106 review of the project is completed pursuant to this Agreement.

132 STIPULATIONS

To the extent of its legal authority, and in coordination with other Signatories, FEMA shall require that the following measures be implemented:

I. GENERAL

A. Applicability

- 1. For FEMA Undertakings that also are within the jurisdiction of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and within the scope of its Section 106 Programmatic Agreements for communication facilities, FEMA defers Section 106 review in accordance with the ACHP Program Comment of October 23, 2009. The approval of funding for the FEMA Undertakings shall be conditioned upon the compliance of the sub-grantee with FCC's applicable Section 106 review, including any required consultation with Tribes. FEMA shall notify the SHPO/THPO when it applies the ACHP Program Comment to an Undertaking. FEMA remains responsible for any FEMA Undertakings it determines are outside of the jurisdiction of the FCC.
- 2. In the event of a Stafford Act major disaster or emergency declaration (Declaration), State, Tribal and local governments may lack the capability to perform or to contract for emergency work, and instead request that the work be accomplished by a Federal agency. Through a mission assignment (MA), FEMA may direct appropriate Federal agencies to perform the work. This Agreement shall apply to such Federal assistance undertaken by or funded by FEMA pursuant to Titles IV and V of the Stafford Act and 44 CFR Part 206.
- 3. FEMA may utilize this Agreement to fulfill its Section 106 responsibilities and those of other Federal agencies that designate FEMA as the lead Federal agency pursuant to 36 CFR §800.2(a)(2) with appropriate notification to the other Signatories and the ACHP regarding Undertakings that fall within the scope of this Agreement. When FEMA is not designated as the lead Federal Agency, all Federal agencies, including FEMA remain individually responsible for their compliance with Section 106.
- 4. If another Federal program or Federal agency has concluded Section 106 consultation review and approved an Undertaking within the past _five (5)_ years, FEMA has no further requirement for Section 106 review provided that FEMA confirms that the scope and effect [as defined by 36 CFR § 800.16(i)] of its Undertaking are the same as that of the Undertaking reviewed by the previous agency, and SHPO and Tribal consultation and concurrence is documented. FEMA shall document these findings to the project file in order to confirm that the requirements of Section 106 have been satisfied. Should FEMA, in consultation with SHPO and participating Tribe(s) determine that the previous Section 106 review was insufficient or involved interagency disagreements about eligibility, effect, and/or treatment measures, FEMA shall conduct additional Section 106 consultation in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- 5. With the concurrence of the Signatories, other Federal agencies providing financial assistance for the type of Program activities covered under the terms of this Agreement

may satisfy their Section 106 responsibilities by accepting and complying with the terms of this Agreement.

- a. Other Federal Agencies may include municipalities who have assumed environmental responsibilities of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and acting as the Responsible Entity pursuant to 24 CFR Part 58, are responsible for environmental review, decision-making and action.
- b. In such situations, the Federal Agency shall notify the Signatories in writing of its intent to use this Agreement to achieve compliance with its Section 106 requirements, and consult with the Signatories regarding its Section 106 compliance responsibilities. Resumes of staff who meet the Secretary's Professional Qualification Standard and will review Tier II projects in accordance with Appendix B of this Agreement shall be provided to FEMA and the SHPO/THPO.
- 6. FEMA has determined that the following types of activities have limited or no potential to affect historic properties and FEMA has no further Section 106 responsibilities with regards to them, pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.3(a)(1):
 - a. Pursuant to 44 CFR § 206.110(m), assistance to individuals and households provided under 44 CFR Part 206, Subpart D and Section 408 of the Stafford Act, including funding for owner occupied home repair and replacement, content replacement, personal property, transportation and healthcare expenses, is exempt from the provisions of Section 106. For ground disturbing activities, and construction related to 44 CFR §§ 206.117(b)(1)(ii) (temporary housing), 206.117(b)(3) (replacement housing), 206.117(b)(4) (permanent housing construction), 206.117(c)(1)(vi) (privately owned access routes) and rental units (multi-family repair), FEMA shall conduct Section 106 review.
 - b. Administrative actions such as personnel actions, travel, procurement of services, supplies (including vehicles and equipment) for the support of day-to-day and emergency operational activities, and the temporary storage of goods provided storage occurs within existing facilities or on previously disturbed soils.
 - c. Preparation, revision, and adoption of regulations, directives, manuals, and other guidance documents.
 - c. Granting of variances, and actions to enforce Federal, State, or local codes, standards or regulations.
 - d. Monitoring, data gathering, and reporting in support of emergency and disaster planning, response and recovery, and hazard activities.

223 e. Research and development of hazard warning systems, hazard mitigation plans, 224 codes and standards, and education/public awareness programs. 225 f. Assistance provided for planning, studies, design and engineering costs that 226 involve no commitment of resources other than staffing and associated funding. 227 228 229 g. Assistance provided for training, management and administration, exercises, and mobile/portable equipment purchases; with the exception of potential ground-230 231 disturbing activities and modification of existing structures. 232 233 h. Community Disaster Loans for funding to perform governmental functions for any eligible jurisdiction in a designated disaster area that has suffered a substantial loss 234 of tax and other revenue. 235 236 237 i. Acquisition or lease of existing facilities where planned uses conform to past use 238 or local land use requirements. 239 i. Funding the administrative action of acquiring properties in acquisition projects, 240 241 including the real estate transaction, but excluding demolition. 242 243 k. Reimbursement of a subgrantee's insurance deductible, when the deductible is the 244 total FEMA eligible cost for the project. 245 1. Labor, equipment and materials used to provide security in the Declaration area, 246 including lease, rental, purchase or repair of equipment or vehicles and payment 247 for staff and contract labor. 248 249 m. Application of pesticides to reduce adverse public health effects, including aerial 250 251 and truck-mounted spraying. 252 253 n. Unemployment assistance. 254 255 o. Distribution of food coupons. 256 257 p. Legal services. 258 259 q. Crisis counseling. 260 261 7. Any FEMA Programs authorized by the United States Congress in the future may be 262 included in this Agreement in accordance with Stipulation IV.A, Amendments. Any change in the FEMA name, Programs, or organizational structure shall not affect this 263 Agreement. 264 265 B. Roles and Responsibilities of the Signatories 266

1. FEMA:

- a. FEMA shall use Federal, Tribal, State, subgrantee, or contractor staff whose qualifications meet the Secretary of the Interior's (Secretary's) Professional Qualifications Standards (Professional Qualifications) set forth in the Federal Register at 48 Fed. Reg. 44716-01 (September 29, 1983), as amended (Qualified), in completing identification and evaluation of historic properties and in making determinations of effects. FEMA shall review any National Register eligibility determination and make its own findings of effect resulting from the performance of these activities prior to submitting such determinations to the SHPO and participating Tribes.
 - i. FEMA acknowledges that Tribes possess special expertise in assessing the National Register eligibility of properties with religious and cultural significance to them. Tribal leaders, and as appropriate, their representatives, shall decide who meets qualifications/standards as defined by their Tribes for review of Undertakings affecting properties with religious and cultural significance.
- b. FEMA alone shall conduct all project consultation with Tribes. In accordance with 36 CFR § 800.2(c)(4), FEMA may authorize the Grantee(s), or a subgrantee through the Grantee(s), to initiate the Section 106 process with the SHPO and other consulting parties, assist in identifying other consulting parties with a demonstrated interest in the Undertaking, and prepare any necessary analyses and documentation, but FEMA will remain responsible for determinations of National Register eligibility and findings of effect recommended by the authorized party. FEMA shall follow the process set forth in Stipulation I.B.1(a), FEMA Roles and Responsibilities, and notify the SHPO in writing when a Grantee or subgrantee has been authorized to initiate consultation on FEMA's behalf.
- c. Prior to authorizing the release of funds for individual Undertakings requiring grant conditions pursuant to this Agreement, FEMA shall inform the Grantee(s) of all stipulations and conditions and ensure that they are understood so they can be adequately conveyed to the subgrantee. FEMA shall work in partnership with the Grantee(s) to provide subgrantees with guidance on in-kind repair pursuant to *The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties 1995 (Standards)*, 36 CFR Part 68, or the most updated version, and techniques to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties.
- d. FEMA shall provide the other Signatories with an annual report for the previous calendar year by April of each year that this Agreement is in effect. This annual report will summarize the actions taken to implement the terms of this Agreement, statistics on Undertakings reviewed, and recommend any actions or revisions to be considered, including updates to the appendices.

312 e. FEMA shall confer annually and as necessary with the other Signatories within 45 days after issuance of the annual report, to review the report and/or discuss 313 314 issues and concerns in greater detail. 315 f. FEMA shall notify the SHPO and affected Tribes, as soon as practicable, 316 following a Declaration to provide specific points of contact and other pertinent 317 information about the Declaration. 318 319 g. FEMA may convene an initial scoping meeting with the Signatories and other 320 interested parties as soon as practicable after each Declaration to address 321 322 Declaration-specific issues and procedures. 323 324 h. FEMA shall ensure that all documentation resulting from Undertakings reviewed 325 pursuant to this Agreement is consistent with applicable SHPO and Tribal 326 guidelines and the confidentiality provisions of 36 CFR § 800.11(c). 2. SHPO: 327 328 329 a. SHPO shall review FEMA's determination of the Areas of Potential Effect (APE), 330 National Register eligibility determinations, and FEMA's effect findings and 331 provide concurrence within timeframes required by this Agreement. 332 333 b. Upon request, the SHPO shall provide FEMA and/or its designee(s) with available 334 information about historic properties (such as access to online systems or site files, GIS data, survey information, geographic areas of concern). Such data sharing 335 336 shallbe memorialized in an agreement. Only Qualified FEMA staff and/or 337 designee(s) shall be afforded access to protected historic property information. 338 339 c. The SHPO shall identify staff or consultants to assist FEMA staff with their 340 Section 106 responsibilities, and identify, in coordination with FEMA, specific 341 activities that SHPO may perform for specific Undertakings as agreed in writing 342 with FEMA. 343 344 d. As requested and necessary, SHPO staff shall be available as a resource and for 345 consultation through site visits, written requests, telephone conversations or electronic media. In those instances where consultation with SHPO has occurred, 346 347 FEMA shall provide a written summary via e-mail or regular mail to SHPO, 348 including any decisions that were reached. 349 350 e. The SHPO may delegate some or all of its responsibilities under this Agreement to 351 one or more Liaisons. The SHPO will confer with FEMA about the selection of 352 any Liaisons, the scope of responsibilities delegated and related implementing 353 procedures. SHPO shall formally document these decisions for concurrence by 354 FEMA. Liaisons are not required to be members of the SHPO staff. 355

f. The SHPO shall participate in an initial scoping meeting for a Declaration.

g. The SHPO may assist local jurisdictions and/or the Grantee(s) in the State of 357 358 Georgia with advance planning efforts to consider historic properties as part of 359 homeland security, including disaster preparedness, response, recovery, and 360 mitigation programs for which FEMA funding may be requested. 361 362 h. The SHPO shall coordinate with FEMA, to identify consulting parties, including 363 any communities, organizations, or individuals that may have an interest in a specific Undertaking and its effects on historic properties. 364 365 366 i. The SHPO shall participate in annual reviews convened by FEMA to review the effectiveness of this Agreement. 367 368 3. GEMA: 369 370 a. The Grantee(s) shall ensure that their subgrantees understand and acknowledge 371 conditions and potential requirements that may be placed upon Undertakings as a 372 result of Section 106 consultation and the provisions of this Agreement. 373 374 b. The Grantee(s) shall participate in an initial scoping meeting for a Declaration. 375 376 c. The Grantee(s) shall ensure that their subgrantees understand that failure to comply with any project-specific conditions that have been placed on their grants could 377 378 jeopardize FEMA funding. 379 380 d. The Grantee(s) shall notify FEMA as soon as possible of any proposed change to 381 the approved scope of work. The Grantee(s) shall direct their subgrantee not to 382 implement the changes to the proposed scope of work until any additional review 383 required by this Agreement is complete. 384 385 e. The Grantee(s) shall ensure that its subgrantees are made aware that in the event of 386 an unexpected discovery involving an Undertaking that has affected a previously 387 unidentified historic property, human remains, or affected a known historic 388 property in an unanticipated manner, the subgrantee will comply with Stipulation 389 III.B, Unexpected Discoveries, Previously Unidentified Properties, or Unexpected 390 Effects. 391 392 f. The Grantee(s) shall ensure that in its subgrant agreements, any scope of work 393 involving ground disturbance, and resultant contracts to execute said work, provide 394 for the protection of and notification protocols for unexpected discoveries or 395 unexpected effects to cultural material and human remains. 396 C. Tribal Consultation 397 398 1. Where no tribe-specific consultation agreements or protocols are in place, FEMA shall

consult with affected Tribe(s) in accordance with 36 CFR Part 800. In determining

who the affected Tribe(s) may be, FEMA will first establish that it is a type of

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Undertaking with potential to affect historic properties with religious and cultural significance and may consult with the SHPO and Tribe(s), and access the National Park Service (NPS) Native American Consultation Database or other tools to identify geographic tribal interests. Appendix D lists individual Tribe's areas of interest, project-type interest, and preferred method of communication

2. FEMA shall ensure that its consultations with other consulting parties shall not include the dissemination of information, when advised of data sensitivity by the Tribe(s), that might risk harm to an American Indian site or property of religious and cultural significance or that might impede the use of such a site by the Tribe(s) in accordance with Section 304 of the NHPA and other applicable laws. Information provided is exempt from public knowledge and disclosure under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) by both Section 304 of the NHPA and Section 9 of the Archaeological Resources Protection Act (ARPA) (16 U.S.C. §470aa – 470mm).

3. FEMA shall invite affected Tribe(s) to participate in initial scoping meeting within their geographic area of interest for each Declaration.

D. Public Participation

 FEMA recognizes that the views of the public are essential to informed decision making throughout the Section 106 consultation process. FEMA shall notify the public of proposed Undertakings in a manner that reflects the nature, complexity, and effect(s) of the Undertaking, the likely public interest given FEMA's specific involvement, and any confidentiality concerns of Tribe(s), private individuals and businesses.

2. FEMA may consult with the Grantee(s), subgrantee, SHPO, and participating Tribe(s), and other consulting parties to determine if there are individuals or organizations with a demonstrated interest in historic properties that should be made aware of an Undertaking. If such parties are identified or identify themselves to FEMA, FEMA shall provide them with information regarding the Undertaking and its effect on historic properties, consistent with the confidentiality provisions of 36 CFR § 800.11(c).

3. In accordance with the outreach strategy developed for an Undertaking in consultation with the SHPO and participating Tribes, for involving the public, FEMA shall identify the appropriate stages for seeking public input during the Section 106 consultation process. FEMA shall consider all views provided by the public regarding an Undertaking.

4. FEMA may also provide public notices and the opportunity for public comment or participation in an Undertaking through the public participation process of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and its implementing regulations set out at 44 CFR Part 10, and/or Executive Orders 11988 and 11990 relating to floodplains and wetlands as set out in 44 CFR Part 9, and Executive Order 12898, Environmental

Justice, provided such notices specifically reference Section 106 as a basis for public involvement.

5. Should a member of the public object in writing to implementation of the Agreement's terms, FEMA will notify the other Signatories in writing and take the objection into consideration. FEMA shall consult with the objecting party and, if that party so requests, the other Signatories, for not more than 30 days. In reaching its decision regarding the objection, FEMA shall take into consideration all comments from these parties. Within 15 days after closure of this consultation period, FEMA shall provide the other parties with its final decision in writing.

E. Timeframes and Communications

1. All time designations shall be in calendar days unless otherwise stipulated. If any Signatory does not object to FEMA's determination related to an Undertaking within an agreed upon timeframe, FEMA may proceed to the next step in the consultation process as described in Stipulation II, Project Review. Due to the varied nature of the individual response times to FEMA's requests comment/concurrence may vary. The consulting parties may send and accept official notices, comments, requests for further information and documentation, and other communications required by this Agreement by e-mail.

a. Files larger than 10 megabytes are required to be divided to ensure they are properly delivered.

 FEMA will use a "read receipt" to ensure the email was received by intended party.

c. FEMA will note the consultation timeline in the subject line of the letter and header of the email to ensure consulting parties are aware of the project's associated timeline.

2. For Emergency Undertakings as outlined in Stipulation II.B.2(c)(i), Expedited Review of Emergency Undertakings, the SHPO and participating Tribe(s) shall respond to any FEMA request for comments within three (3) business days after receipt, unless FEMA determines the nature of the emergency action warrants a shorter time period.

3. For Undertakings associated with the Individual Assistance (IA) and Public Assistance (PA) programs, the review time shall be a maximum of fifteen (15) days from the date of receipt.

4. For the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) and all non-disaster programs, the response time for each request for concurrence shall be a maximum of thirty (30) days.

II. PROJECT REVIEW

488	A.	Programmatic	Allowances

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1. If FEMA determines an Undertaking conforms to one or more allowances in Appendix
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B of this Agreement, FEMA shall complete the Section 106 review process by
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documenting this determination in the project file, without SHPO review or

notification.

- 2. If the Undertaking involves a National Historic Landmark (NHL), FEMA shall notify the SHPO, participating Tribe(s), and the appropriate NPS NHL Program Manager from the Southeast Region that the Undertaking conforms to one or more allowances. FEMA shall provide information about the proposed scope of work for the Undertaking and the allowance(s) enabling FEMA's determination.
 - 3. If FEMA determines any portion of an Undertaking's scope of work does not conform to one or more allowances listed in Appendix B, FEMA shall conduct Section 106 review for the entire Undertaking in accordance with Stipulation II.B. Expedited Review for Emergency Undertakings, or Stipulation II.C. Standard Project Review.
 - 4. Allowances may be revised and new allowances may be added to this Agreement in accordance with Stipulation IV.A.3, Amendments.

B. Expedited Review for Emergency Undertakings

1. Determine Expedited Review

- a. As part of the Declaration process, FEMA shall define the time interval during which the disaster causing incident occurs (the incident period, as defined in 44 CFR § 206.32(f)). FEMA may approve Federal assistance and/or funding for emergency work (as defined in 44 CFR § 206.201(b)) that occurs during the incident period, including work already completed, in response to an immediate threat to human health and safety or property. Pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.12(d), FEMA may conduct expedited review of emergency Undertakings for 30 days from the beginning of the incident period.
- b. Should FEMA determine that it is necessary to extend the expedited review period beyond the initial 30 days, FEMA shall, in 30-day increments, as needed, notify in writing the ACHP, SHPO and participating Tribe(s).

2. Conduct Expedited Reviews

a. If the Undertaking is an immediate rescue and salvage operation conducted in response to an event to preserve life and property, FEMA has no Section 106 consultation responsibilities in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.12(d); or

- b. If the Undertaking meets one or more of the Allowances in Appendix B of this Agreement, FEMA shall complete the Section 106 review process pursuant to Stipulation II.A.1, Programmatic Allowances.
- c. If FEMA determines that the Undertaking would adversely affect a historic property during this expedited review period:
 - i. To the extent practicable FEMA will propose treatment measures that would address adverse effects during implementation, and request the comments of the SHPO and participating Tribes within 3 business days of receipt of this information unless FEMA determines the nature of the emergency warrants a shorter time period.
 - ii. FEMA may provide this information through written requests, telephone conversations, meetings, or electronic media. In all cases, FEMA shall clarify that an "expedited review" is being requested for the Undertaking.
 - iii. FEMA shall take into account any timely comments provided by SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s).
 - iv. Should the SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s) not comment within 3 business days, FEMA may fund the emergency Undertaking based on the available information. This will complete the Section 106 consultation for the Undertaking.
 - FEMA shall notify the SHPO and participating Tribe(s) of the final decision, indicating how any comments received were considered in reaching that decision.
- C. Standard Project Review: For Undertakings not exempt from further Section 106 review, FEMA shall ensure that the following standard project review steps are implemented. In the interest of streamlining, FEMA may combine some or all of these steps during consultation.
 - 1. Consulting Parties: FEMA shall consider all written requests of individuals and organizations to participate as consulting parties, and consult with the SHPO and participating Tribes to identify any other parties that meet the criteria to be consulting parties and invite them to participate in the Section 106 process. FEMA shall invite any individual or organization that will assume a specific role or responsibility outlined in a Section 106 agreement document to participate as a signatory party. FEMA may invite others to participate as consulting parties as the Section 106 consultation proceeds.
 - 2. <u>Area of Potential Effects:</u> For standing structures not adjacent to or located within the boundaries of a National Register or eligible district, Qualified staff shall define the APE as the individual structure when the proposed Undertaking is limited to the repair

- or rehabilitation (as defined in 36 CFR § 68.3(b)). For all other Undertakings, Qualified staff shall determine the APE in consultation with the SHPO and participating Tribe(s). FEMA may consider information provided by other parties, such as local governments and the public, when establishing the APE.
- 3. <u>Identification and Evaluation:</u> Qualified staff shall determine, in consultation with the SHPO and participating Tribe(s) if the APE contains historic properties, including archaeological sites or properties of religious or cultural significance, that are listed in or potentially eligible for the National Register. This may include the review of documentation provided by the Grantee(s) or subgrantee in coordination with the SHPO and participating Tribes.
 - a. Level of Effort: FEMA shall make a reasonable and good faith effort to identify historic properties in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.4(b)(1). FEMA may consult with the SHPO to determine the level of effort and methodology necessary to identify and evaluate a variety of historic property types. For properties of religious and cultural significance to affected Tribe(s), FEMA shall consult with the affected Tribe(s) to determine geographical areas containing them that may be affected by an Undertaking and determine the necessary level of effort to identify and evaluate or avoid any such historic properties.
 - b. National Historic Landmarks: When FEMA determines an Undertaking has the potential to affect an NHL, FEMA shall notify the Secretary through the appropriate NPS NHL Program Manager from the Southeast Region in addition to the SHPO, participating Tribe(s), and other consulting parties.
 - c. <u>Determinations of Eligibility:</u> FEMA shall review or determine National Register eligibility based on identification and evaluation efforts, and consult with SHPO and participating Tribe(s) regarding these determinations. Should the SHPO or participating Tribe(s) disagree with the determination of eligibility, FEMA shall either:
 - i. Elect to consult further with the objecting party;
 - ii. Treat the property as eligible for the National Register; or
 - iii. Obtain a determination of eligibility from the Keeper of the National Register in accordance with 36 CFR § 63.2(d)-(e) and 36 CFR § 800.4(c)(2).
- 4. Findings of No Historic Properties Affected: FEMA shall make a finding of "no historic properties affected" under the following circumstances:
 - a. If no historic properties are present in the APE;
 - b. The Undertaking is designed to avoid historic properties, including archaeological sites or properties of religious or cultural significance to participating Tribe(s); or

- c. The Undertaking does not affect the character defining features of a historic property.
- d. FEMA shall notify the SHPO, participating Tribes(s), and any other consulting parties of this finding and provide supporting documentation in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.11(d). Unless the SHPO or participating Tribe(s) object to the finding within the timeframe outlined in Stipulation I.E, Timeframes and Communications, FEMA shall complete the Section 106 review.
- e. If the SHPO or participating Tribe(s) objects to a finding of "no historic properties affected," FEMA shall consult with the objecting party to resolve the disagreement.
 - i. If the objection is resolved, FEMA either may proceed with the Undertaking in accordance with the resolution or reconsider effects on the historic property by applying the criteria of adverse effect pursuant to Stipulation II.C.5, Application of the Criteria of Adverse Effect, below.
 - ii. If FEMA is unable to resolve the disagreement, it will forward the finding and supporting documentation to the ACHP and request that the ACHP review FEMA's finding in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.4(d)(1)(iv)(A) through 36 CFR § 800.4(d)(1)(iv)(C). FEMA shall consider the ACHP's recommendation in making its final determination. If FEMA's final determination is to reaffirm its 'no historic properties affected" finding, the Section 106 review of the Undertaking will have concluded. Otherwise, FEMA will proceed to Stipulation II.C.5., below.
- 5. Application of the Criteria of Adverse Effect: If FEMA finds an Undertaking may affect historic properties in the APE, including properties of religious or cultural significance to affected Tribe(s), FEMA shall apply the criteria of adverse effect to historic properties within the APE(s), taking into account the views of the consulting parties and public concerning effects in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.5(a).
 - a. If FEMA determines that an Undertaking does not meet the adverse effect criteria, FEMA shall propose a finding of "no adverse effect" in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.5(b).
 - i. FEMA shall notify the SHPO, participating Tribe(s), and all other consulting parties of its finding and provide supporting documentation pursuant to 36 CFR §800.11(e).
 - ii. Unless a consulting party objects within the applicable timeframe outlined in Stipulation I.E. Timeframes and Communications, FEMA will proceed with its "no adverse effect" determination and complete the Section 106 review.

- iii. If a consulting party objects to a finding of "no adverse effect," FEMA will consult with the objecting party to resolve the disagreement.
 - 1. If the objection is resolved, FEMA shall proceed with the Undertaking in accordance with the resolution, or;
 - 2. If the objection cannot be resolved, FEMA shall request that the ACHP review the findings in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.5(c)(3)(i)-(ii) and submit the required supporting documentation. FEMA shall consider the ACHP's comments in making its final determination.
- b. If FEMA finds the Undertaking may adversely affect historic properties, FEMA shall request through the Grantee(s) that the subgrantee revise the scope of work to substantially conform to the *Standards* for standing structures, or avoid or minimize adverse effects for National Register listed or eligible archaeological properties.
 - i. If the subgrantee modifies the scope of work to avoid the adverse effect, FEMA shall notify the consulting parties, and provide supporting documentation. Unless a consulting party makes a timely objection, in accordance with the applicable timeframe outlined in Stipulation I.E. Timeframes and Communications, FEMA shall proceed with its "no adverse effect" determination, including any conditions, and complete the Section 106 review.
 - ii. If an Undertaking is not modified to avoid the adverse effect(s), FEMA shall initiate consultation to resolve the adverse effect(s) in accordance with Stipulation II.C.6, Resolution of Adverse Effects.
- 6. Resolution of Adverse Effects: If FEMA determines that an Undertaking may adversely affect a historic property, it shall resolve the effects of the Undertaking in consultation with the SHPO, Grantee(s), subgrantee, participating Tribe(s), the ACHP, if participating, and other consulting parties, by one of the following methods depending upon the severity of the adverse effect as well as the determination of the historic property's significance on a local, state or national level. When FEMA determines an Undertaking will adversely affect an NHL, FEMA shall notify and invite the Secretary and ACHP to participate in consultation in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.10. When the ACHP participates in consultation related to an NHL, the ACHP shall report the outcome of the consultation to the Secretary and the FEMA Administrator.
 - a. Abbreviated Consultation Process: After taking into consideration the significance of the historic properties affected, the severity of the adverse effect(s), and avoidance and minimization of adverse effect(s), FEMA may propose in writing to the consulting parties to resolve the adverse effects of the Undertaking through the application of one or more Treatment Measures outlined in Appendix C as negotiated with the SHPO and participating Tribes. The use of these Treatment

Measures shall not require the execution of a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) or Programmatic Agreement.

- i. In consultation with the SHPO, participating Tribe(s), and other consulting parties, FEMA shall propose in writing the implementation of a specific Treatment Measure, or combination of Treatment Measures, with the intent of expediting the resolution of adverse effects, and provide documentation as required by 36 CFR § 800.11(e) and subject to the confidentiality provisions of 36 CFR § 800.11(c). Unless a consulting party or the ACHP objects within 15 days of receipt of FEMA's proposal, FEMA shall proceed with the use of the Treatment Measure(s) and will complete the Section 106 review.
- ii. If any of the consulting parties or the ACHP objects within the 15 day review and comment period to the resolution of adverse effects through the application of the Abbreviated Consultation Process, FEMA shall resolve the adverse effect(s) using procedures outlined below in Stipulation II.C.6(b), Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) or Stipulation II.C.6(c), Programmatic Agreement.
- iii. Because funding and implementation details of Treatment Measures for specific Undertakings may vary by program, FEMA shall provide written notice to the consulting parties within sixty (60) days of the completion of the Treatment Measure(s). This written notice will serve as confirmation that the Treatment Measure(s) for a specific Undertaking have been implemented. FEMA also shall include information pertaining to the completion of Treatment Measures in the annual report pursuant to Stipulation I.B.1(d), FEMA Roles and Responsibilities.
- b. Memorandum of Agreement: FEMA shall provide the ACHP with an adverse effect notice in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.6(a)(1) if it has not already provided such under the Abbreviated Consultation Process of this Agreement, if a consulting party of the ACHP objects in accordance with Stipulation II.C.6.(a)(ii) or if FEMA in consultation with the SHPO, participating Tribes, and other consulting parties has determined that an MOA would be more appropriate to resolve the adverse effect(s). In consultation with the other consulting parties, including the ACHP (if participating), FEMA shall develop an MOA, in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.6(c) to agree upon treatment measures to avoid, minimize, and/or mitigate adverse effects on historic properties. The MOA may also include treatment measures that serve an equal or greater public benefit in promoting the preservation of historic properties in lieu of more traditional treatment measures.
- c. Programmatic Agreement: Should the execution of an MOA be inappropriate given the similar nature of effects on historic properties, the inability to determine effects prior to approval of an Undertaking, or where other circumstances warrant. FEMA shall consult with the SHPO, participating Tribe(s), the ACHP, if

participating, and any other consulting party to develop a Programmatic Agreement in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.14(b) and to identify programmatic conditions or treatment measures to govern the resolution of potential or anticipated adverse effects from certain complex project situations for an Undertaking or for multiple but similar Undertakings by a single subgrantee.

d. Objections: Should any signatory, consulting party, or member of the public object within the timeframes established by this Agreement to any plans, specifications, or actions pursuant to resolving an adverse effect, FEMA shall consult further with the objecting party to seek resolution. If FEMA determines the objection cannot be resolved, FEMA shall address in accordance with Stipulation IV.B, Dispute Resolution.

III. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- A. Changes to an Approved Scope of Work: The Grantee(s) shall notify FEMA and shall require a subgrantee to notify it immediately when a subgrantee proposes changes to an approved scope of work for an Undertaking.
 - 1. If FEMA determines the change meets an Allowance or has no effect on the property, FEMA shall approve the change.
 - 2. If the change can be modified to meet an Allowance, or conform to any applicable SOI Standards, FEMA shall complete its Section 106 review responsibilities.
 - 3. If FEMA determines that the change does not meet an Allowance, FEMA shall initiate consultation pursuant to Stipulation II.C, Standard Project Review.
- B. Unexpected Discoveries, Previously Unidentified Properties, or Unexpected Effects:
 - Upon notification by a subgrantee of an unexpected discovery, or if it appears that a
 Undertaking has affected a previously unidentified property or affected a known
 historic property in an unanticipated manner, in accordance with Stipulation I.B.3(e),
 Grantee(s) Roles and Responsibilities, the Grantee(s) shall immediately notify FEMA
 and require the subgrantee to:
 - a. Stop construction activities in the vicinity of the discovery.
 - b. Take all reasonable measures to avoid or minimize harm to the property until FEMA has completed consultation with the SHPO or participating Tribe(s), and any other consulting parties. Upon notification by the Grantee of a discovery, FEMA shall immediately notify the SHPO, participating Tribe(s), and other consulting parties that may have an interest in the discovery, previously unidentified property or unexpected effects, and consult to evaluate the discovery

for National Register eligibility and/or the effects of the Undertaking on historic properties.

- c. If human remains are discovered, notify the local law enforcement office and coroner/medical examiner in accordance with Georgia Statute (OCGA) 31-21-6 and OGCA 44-12-280 and protect the remains from any harm. Discoveries of human remains on Federal or Tribal lands shall be subject to the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) (25 U.S.C. §3001-3013, 18 U.S.C. § 1170) and ARPA, as applicable.
- d. Assist FEMA in completing the following actions, as required:
 - i. FEMA shall consult with the consulting parties in accordance with the consultation process outlined in Stipulation II, Project Review, to develop a mutually agreeable action plan with timeframes to identify the discovery or previously unidentified property, take into account the effects of the Undertaking, resolve adverse effects if necessary, and ensure compliance with applicable Federal, State, and local statutes.
 - ii. FEMA shall coordinate with the Grantee(s) and the subgrantee regarding any needed modification to the scope of work for the Undertaking necessary to implement recommendations of the consultation and facilitate proceeding with the Undertaking.
 - iii. In cases where discovered human remains are determined to be American Indian, FEMA shall consult with the appropriate Tribal representatives and SHPO. In addition, FEMA shall follow the guidelines outlined in the ACHP's Policy Statement Regarding the Treatment of Burial Sites, Human Remains, and Funerary Objects (2007) and any state-specific policies that may be in force.

C. Curation

- 1. In cases where survey and testing are conducted on private land, any recovered collections remain the property of the land owner. In such instances, FEMA and the Grantee(s), in coordination with the SHPO and affected Tribe(s), shall encourage land owners to donate the collection(s) to an appropriate public or Tribal entity. In cases where the property owner wishes to transfer ownership of the collection(s) to a public or Tribal entity, and in the case of artifacts recovered from public lands, FEMA and the Grantee(s) shall ensure that recovered artifacts and related documentation are curated in a suitable repository as agreed to by FEMA, SHPO, and affected Tribe(s), and following applicable State guidelines.
- 2. When an Undertaking will adversely affect an archaeological property, FEMA may treat the adverse effect by providing for the recovery of significant information through archaeological data recovery. FEMA will consult with the other consulting parties to prepare a research design (data recovery plan), including a specific plan for

curation. This plan will incorporate any relevant curation provisions contained in the SHPO's Standards and Guidelines for Conducting Archaeological Surveys (http://georgia-archaeology.org/GCPA/wp-content/uploads/2007/05/ga standards final.pdf), ACHP's "Recommended Approach for Consultation on Recovery of Significant Information from Archaeological Sites" published in the Federal Register (64 Federal Register 27085-27087 (May 18, 1999)), or other provisions agreed to by the consulting parties. No excavation should be initiated before FEMA acceptance and approval of the curation plan. a. As stipulated in the curation plan, artifacts, as well as field and laboratory records sufficient to document the collection, will be curated at a facility, preferably in-

sufficient to document the collection, will be curated at a facility, preferably instate, that meets the standards of, and in accordance with the provisions of 36 CFR Part 79, "Curation of Federally Owned and Administered Archaeological Collections," and applicable State or Tribal requirements.

- D. Review of Undertakings Initiated Before Initiation of Completion of Section 106
 - 1. In accordance with Section 110(k) of the NHPA, FEMA shall not grant assistance to a subgrantee who, with intent to avoid the requirements of this Agreement or Section 106 of the NHPA, has intentionally significantly and adversely affected a historic property to which assistance would relate, or having legal power to prevent it, allowed an adverse effect to occur. However, if after consultation with the SHPO, affected Tribe(s), and ACHP, FEMA determines that extraordinary circumstances justify granting assistance despite the adverse effect created or permitted by the subgrantee, FEMA shall complete consultation for the Undertaking pursuant to the terms of this Agreement.
 - 2. FEMA shall specifically advise the Grantee(s) and shall require that the Grantee(s) advise its subgrantees in writing that they may jeopardize Federal funding if work is performed without all required local, State, and Federal licenses, permits, and/or approvals, including the completion of the Section 106 process. FEMA also shall document this requirement in its Record of Environmental Consideration, as applicable, as well as all project approval documents specifying the project scope and limits, and containing all conditions and caveats.
 - 3. In circumstances where FEMA determines a subgrantee has initiated an Undertaking without willful intent to avoid the requirements of this Agreement or Section 106 of NHPA, FEMA shall proceed as follows:
 - a. Determine if the Undertaking is of a type for which FEMA has no further Section 106 responsibilities, namely:
 - i. An Undertaking listed in Stipulation I.A.8; or
 - ii. An immediate rescue and salvage operation in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.12(d); or

891 iii. A Programmatic Allowance as described under Stipulation II.A, 892 893 b. In any such cases, FEMA will document this determination in the project files, and 894 consider the Undertaking Section 106 compliant. 895 896 c. If FEMA determines the Undertaking would have required Section 106 review, 897 FEMA shall coordinate with the SHPO and affected Tribe(s) to determine if 898 consultation is feasible. 899 i. If after coordination with the SHPO and affected Tribes, FEMA determines 900 that consultation is feasible, FEMA shall review the Undertaking in accordance 901 with Stipulation II.C, Standard Project Review. 902 ii. If after coordination with the SHPO and affected Tribe(s), FEMA determines 903 that review is infeasible, FEMA shall document the outcome to the Section 106 904 process, and the applicable FEMA program shall take the outcome into account 905 before making a decision whether to fund the Undertaking. FEMA shall 906 provide written notification of its decision to SHPO, appropriate Tribe(s), and 907 the ACHP. 908 909 4. FEMA shall ensure that all Undertakings considered for after the fact review in 910 accordance with this stipulation are included in the annual report. 911 IV. IMPLEMENTATION OF AGREEMENT 912 913 914 A. Amendments 915 916 1. If any Signatory determines that an amendment to the terms of this Agreement must be 917 made, the Signatories shall consult for no more than 30 days to seek amendment of the 918 Agreement 919 920 2. An amendment to this Agreement, exclusive of the appendices, shall be effective only 921 when it has been signed by the Signatories. 922 923 3. Appendix A (FEMA Programs), Appendix B (Programmatic Allowances), and Appendix C (Treatment Measures), Appendix D (Tribal Areas of Interest) may be 924 925 amended at the request of FEMA or another Signatory party in the following manner: 926 927 a. FEMA, on its own behalf or on behalf of another Signatory, shall notify the Signatories of the intent to modify the current Appendix or Appendices and shall 928 929 provide a draft of the updated Appendix or Appendices to all Signatory parties. 930 931 b. If no other Signatory objects in writing within 30 days of receipt of FEMA's 932 proposed modification, FEMA shall date and sign the amended Appendix and 933 provide a copy of the amended Appendix to the other Signatories.

B. Dispute Resolution

- 1. Should any Signatory object in writing to the terms of this Agreement, FEMA shall consult with the objecting party for not more than 45 days to resolve the objection.
- 2. If the objection is resolved within 45 days, FEMA shall proceed in accordance with the resolution.
- 3. If FEMA determines within 45 days that the objection cannot be resolved, FEMA shall forward to ACHP all documentation relevant to the objection, including FEMA's proposed resolution. Within 30 days of receipt, ACHP will:
 - a. Concur in FEMA's proposed resolution; or
 - b. Provide FEMA with recommendations, which FEMA shall take into account in reaching a final decision regarding the objection; or
 - c. Notify FEMA that the objection will be referred for comment in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.7(a)(4), and proceed to do so.
- 4. FEMA shall take into account any ACHP recommendations or comments, and any comments from the other Signatories, in reaching a final decision regarding the objection. FEMA shall provide in writing to the ACHP and Signatories a summary of its final decision before authorizing disputed action to proceed. The Signatories shall continue to implement all other terms of this Agreement that are not subject to objection.
- 5. Should ACHP not respond within 30 days, FEMA may assume ACHP has no comment and proceed with its proposed resolution to the objection.

C. Severability and Termination

- 1. In the event any provision of this Agreement is deemed to be contrary to, or in violation of, any applicable existing law or regulation of the United States of America, only the conflicting provision(s) shall be deemed null and void, and the remaining provisions of the Agreement shall remain in effect.
- 2. FEMA, the SHPO, Grantee(s), or participating Tribe(s) may terminate this Agreement by providing 30 days written notice to the other Signatories, provided that the Signatories consult during this period to seek amendments or other actions that would prevent termination. If this Agreement is terminated, FEMA will comply with 36 CFR Part 800. Upon such determination, FEMA shall provide all other signatories with written notice of the termination of this Agreement.
- 3. A participating Tribe may notify the other Signatories that it is fully withdrawing from participation in the Agreement. Following such a withdrawal, FEMA shall review

undertakings that may affect historic properties of religious and cultural significance to the Tribe in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.3 through 800.7, 36 CFR § 800.8(c) or an applicable alternative under 36 CFR § 800.14. Withdrawal from this Agreement by a Tribe does not terminate the Agreement. At any time that this Agreement remains in effect, a Tribe that has withdrawn from the Agreement may notify FEMA, the Grantee(s), and SHPO in writing that it has rescinded its notice withdrawing from participation in the Agreement.

 4. This Agreement may be terminated by the implementation of a subsequent Agreement pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.14(b) that explicitly terminates or supersedes this Agreement, or by FEMA's implementation of Alternate Procedures, pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.14(a).

D. Duration and Extension

 1. This Agreement shall remain in effect from the date of execution for a period not to exceed 7 years unless otherwise extended pursuant to Stipulation IV.D.2 below, or until FEMA, in consultation with all other signatories, determines that the terms of this Agreement should be terminated pursuant to Stipulation IV.C.2 or IV.C.4, Severability and Termination. The Agreement shall remain in effect for Declarations made prior to expiration of the Agreement in order to minimize delays in delivery of FEMA assistance.

 2. The signatories may collectively agree to extend this Agreement to cover additional calendar years, or portions thereof, through an amendment in accordance with Stipulation IV.A, Amendments, provided that the original Agreement has not expired.

 E. Execution and Implementation

 This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, with a separate page for each signatory, and shall become effective on the date of the final signature of FEMA and the SHPO/THPO.

2. The Agreement shall go into effect for participating Tribe(s) once the Agreement has been signed by the Tribe(s).

3. FEMA shall ensure that each Signatory is provided with a complete copy of the

Agreement, including an original set of signatures.

4. Execution and implementation of this Agreement evidence that FEMA has afforded ACHP a reasonable opportunity to comment on FEMA's administration of all referenced Programs, and that FEMA has satisfied its Section 106 responsibilities for all individual Undertakings of its Programs.

- developing integrated regional systems for prevention, protection, response and recovery.

- 1166 Metropolitan Medical Response System (MMRS) Program
- 1167 The MMRS program supports the integration of emergency management, health, and medical
- 1168 systems into a coordinated response to mass casualty incidents caused by any hazard. Successful
- MMRS grantees reduce the consequences of a mass casualty incident during the initial period of a
- 1170 response by having augmented existing local operational response systems before the incident

- 1184 Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP)
- NSGP provides funding support for target-hardening activities to nonprofit organizations that are
- at high risk of a terrorist attack and are located within one of the specific UASI-eligible urban
- 1187 areas.

- 1189 Operation Stonegarden (OPSG)
- The intent of OPSG is to enhance cooperation and coordination among local, State and Federal
- 1191 law enforcement agencies in a joint mission to secure the United States borders along routes of

- 1192 ingress from international borders to include travel corridors in States bordering Mexico and
- 1193 Canada, as well as States and territories with international water borders.

- 1195 Transit Security Grant Program (TSGP)
- The TSGP provides grant funding to the nation's key high-threat urban areas to enhance security measures for their critical transit infrastructure including bus, ferry and rail systems.

1198

- 1199 Freight Rail Security Grant Program (FRSGP)
- The FRSGP funds security training for frontline employees, the completion of vulnerability assessments, the development of security plans within the freight rail industry and GPS tracking systems for railroad cars transporting toxic inhalation materials.

1203

- 1204 Intercity Passenger Rail (Amtrak)
- The purpose of the Intercity Passenger Rail (IPR) is to create a sustainable, risk-based effort to protect critical surface transportation infrastructure and the traveling public from acts of terrorism, major disasters and other emergencies within the Amtrak rail system.

1208

- 1209 Port Security Grant Program (PSGP)
- The PSGP provides grant funding to port areas for the protection of critical port infrastructure from terrorism. PSGP funds are primarily intended to assist ports in enhancing maritime domain awareness, enhancing risk management capabilities to prevent, detect, respond to and recover from attacks involving improvised explosive devices (IEDs), weapons of mass destruction (WMDs) and other non-conventional weapons, as well as training and exercises and
- 1215 Transportation Worker Identification Credential (TWIC) implementation.

1216

- 1217 Intercity Bus Security Grant Program (IBSGP)
- The IBSGP provides funding to create a sustainable program for the protection of intercity bus systems and the traveling public from terrorism. The program seeks to assist operators of fixedroute intercity and charter bus services in obtaining the resources required to support security measures such as enhanced planning, facility security upgrades and vehicle and driver protection.

1222

- 1223 Trucking Security Program (TSP)
- TSP funding will be awarded to eligible applicants to implement security improvement measures and policies deemed valuable by DHS as indicated in the *Security Action Items* publication of June 26, 2008. These items are primarily focused on the purchase and installation or enhancement of equipment and systems related to tractor and trailer tracking systems. Additionally, the TSP will provide funding to develop a system for DHS to monitor, collect and analyze tracking information; and develop plans to improve the effectiveness of transportation and distribution of supplies and commodities during catastrophic events.

- 1232 Buffer Zone Protection Program (BZPP)
- 1233 The BZPP provides funding to increase the preparedness capabilities of jurisdictions responsible
- for the safety and security of communities surrounding high-priority pre-designated Tier 1 and
- 1235 Tier 2 critical infrastructure and key resource (CIKR) assets, including chemical facilities,
- 1236 financial institutions, nuclear and electric power plants, dams, stadiums and other high-risk/high-
- 1237 consequence facilities, through allowable planning and equipment acquisition.

1239 Emergency Management Performance Grants (EMPG)

The purpose of the EMPG program is to assist State and local governments in enhancing and sustaining all-hazards emergency management capabilities.

Interoperable Emergency Communications Grant Program (IECGP)

IECGP provides governance, planning, training and exercise and equipment funding to States, territories, and local and Tribal governments to carry out initiatives to improve interoperable emergency communications, including communications in collective response to natural disasters, acts of terrorism and other man-made disasters. According to the legislation that created IECGP, all proposed activities must be integral to interoperable emergency communications and must be aligned with the goals, objectives, and initiatives identified in the grantee's approved statewide Communication Interoperability Plans (SCIP). IECGP will also advance DHS near-term priorities that are deemed critical to improving interoperable emergency communications and are consistent with goals and objectives of the National Emergency Communications Plan.

Emergency Operations Center (EOC) Grant Program

The EOC grant program is intended to improve emergency management and preparedness capabilities by supporting flexible, sustainable, secure, and interoperable Emergency Operations Centers (EOCs) with a focus on addressing identified deficiencies and needs. This program provides funding for construction or renovation of a State, local, or tribal governments' principal EOC. Fully capable emergency operations facilities at the State and local levels are an essential element of a comprehensive national emergency management system and are necessary to ensure continuity of operations and continuity of government in major disasters caused by any hazard.

Driver's License Security Grant Program

The purpose of the Driver's License Security Grant Program is to prevent terrorism, reduce fraud, and improve the reliability and accuracy of personal identification documents that States and territories issue.

Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS)

The Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS) was established by Executive Order 13407 in 2006. In the event of a national emergency, the President may use IPAWS to send a message to the American people quickly and simultaneously through multiple communications pathways. FEMA has identified several radio transmission sites across the nation which provide significantly powerful signals for this purpose, and is responsible for upgrading, maintaining, and managing the agency installed and owned auxiliary fuel systems at each of these radio transmission sites.

1278 **Programmatic Allowances** 1279 1280 This list of Allowances enumerates FEMA funded activities that based on FEMA experience have no or limited effect on historic properties if implemented as specified in this Appendix and will 1281 1282 not require review by the SHPO and participating Tribe(s). 1283 1284 The allowances consist of two tiers - First Tier and Second Tier. - a. In-kind repair or replacement, or limited upgrading of interior utility systems, including mechanical (e.g., heating, ventilation, air conditioning), electrical, and plumbing systems. This allowance does not provide for the installation of new exposed ductwork.
- b. Elevation of heating, ventilation, and air conditioning system (HVAC) and mechanical equipment as long as it is placed or located where it is not highly visible from the street.
- c. Installation or replacement of interior fire detection, fire suppression, or security alarm systems. The allowance does not apply to surface mounted wiring, conduits, piping, etc., unless previously existing, provided that installation of the system hardware does not damage or cause the removal of character-defining architectural features and can be easily removed in the future.
- d. Installation of communication and surveillance security systems, such as cameras, closed-circuit television, alarm systems, and public address systems, provided that installation of the system hardware does not damage or cause the removal of character defining architectural features and can be easily removed in the future.

e. Installation of building access security devices, such as card readers, enhanced locks, and security scanners (e.g., metal detectors), provided the device does not damage or cause the removal of character-defining architectural features and can be removed in the future without impacts to significant architectural features.

4. Windows and Doors

This allowance permits minor improvement to meet current code and standards or hazard mitigation measures, such as those designed to harden exposed surfaces, including the application of gravel armoring to side slopes and ditches.
- b. In kind repair to historic paving materials for roads and walkways.
- c. In-kind repair or replacement, or minor upgrade of culvert systems and arches beneath roads or within associated drainage systems, including provision of headwalls, riprap and any modest increase in capacity for the purposes of hazard mitigation or to meet current codes and standards, provided that the work substantially conforms to the existing footprint. For stone or brick culverts or arches beneath roadways, this allowance only applies to in-kind repair.
- d. In-kind repair or replacement of road lighting systems, including period lighting fixture styles.
- e. In-kind repair or replacement of road appurtenances such as curbs, berms, fences, and sidewalks.

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- a. Installation of a temporary (Bailey-type) bridge over an existing structure or at a previously disturbed location, such as a former bridge location, to allow passage of emergency vehicles.
- b. In-kind repair or replacement of bridges and bridge components (e.g. abutments, wing walls, piers, decks, and fenders) in previously disturbed soils.

This Appendix may be amended in accordance with Stipulation IV.A.3 of this Agreement, Amendments.

A. Recordation

- 1. <u>Digital Photography Package:</u> Prior to project implementation, the designated responsible party shall oversee the successful delivery of a digital photography package prepared by staff or contractors meeting the Professional Qualifications for Architectural History, History, Architecture, or Historic Architecture, as appropriate. The digital photography package will meet the standards cited in the *Georgia Guidelines for Establishing a Photographic Permanent Archival Record http://georgiashpo.org/sites/uploads/hpd/pdf/PAR%20guidelines.*
 - a. Content: at minimum a completed digital photography package must include the following supporting documentation in addition to the photography listed above:
 - i. An introductory page providing the appropriate project number, and HP number. This page should also include a 3 to 4 sentence brief description of the resource along with an explanation of why it is significant.
 - ii. A second page providing information on the geographic location of the resource. This information will consist of the name of the property, street address, city, county, and UTM coordinates. Geographic information should be separated out from text paragraphs and more general location information such as cross road references should be included.
 - iii. A map documenting the resource's location in relation to its surrounding area. County maps should be used to provide this information. A thumbnail map showing general location on a state map and a more detailed county or city map pinpointing the location is recommended.
 - iv. A sketch map/site plan illustrating the resource and its immediate surroundings. Plat books, insurance maps, birds-eye view, district highway maps, or hand-drawn maps are acceptable. Sketch maps need not be drawn to a precise scale. A number and vantage point of each accompanying photograph should be labeled on the sketch map.

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- v. A photograph log providing the following information: name of the resource, street address of the property including city and county, name of photographer, date photographs were taken, location of the digital files, photograph number, and description of the view indicating the direction of the camera (ex. View of façade, facing west).
- vi. In cases, where a resource has been shown to be exceptionally significant based on its historic importance of for possessing a high degree of architectural integrity, supplementary information may be required. This information should convey the significance of the resource through a detailed architectural description and/or short summary of its historic importance
- vii. Photograph proof sheets of all digital photographs with six (6) per page.
- viii. All documentation must be printed on archival-stable paper. This includes all attachments, appendices, plans, photocopies, and other supplemental material.
- ix. Provide additional digital copy in PDF format that includes all information mentioned above.
- b. Technical Considerations: for digital documentation, the minimum requires is as follows:
 - i. Camera must be 7.2 megapixel DSLR or greater.
 - ii. Perspective controlled (pc) lense use is recommended.
 - iii. At least three exposures of each view or angle should be taken. The best version should be included in the photography package.
 - iv. In order to capture details and allow for greater enlargement of the images, the photographs should be submitted in raw format, TIF (minimum 8 x 10 and 360 dpi saves as 8 bit files 16 bit files will not be accepted) and JPEG (minimum 1024 x 1024 and 100 dpi).
 - v. Images should be saved to a media that is designed for long-term (over 100 years) storage of sensitive data, video or music files. The media should be archivally labeled using felt type and solvent pen and no adhesive details).
- Production: the following represents the minimum level of standards necessary for document retention at SHPO.
 - All paper and media included should be archivally stable. Reports should use headings to separate topics, include an index if applicable, and when and who prepared the report.

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- ii. All documentation shall be stored loose in an archivally stable folder. The folder shall have sides and a flap over the top to keep the documentation secure. Each resource recorded should be presented in its own separate folder with all supporting documentation.
- iii. All documentation should be the size of an 8 ½ x 11 sheet of paper. If large plan sheets must be inserted in the document, consider photographing the plans either with a copy stand or by tacking the plans to a wall and photographing them using a tripod.
- iv. No pins, paper clips, staples, rubber bands, or stick-on labels shall be attached to the document.
- v. No ballpoint pen ink or felt-tip pens should ever be used on photographs, negatives, or paper.
- d. When mitigating larger historic resources such as agricultural properties, aerial photography of the landscape should be included as part of the PAR, provided that an aerial view of the resource is available.
- e. When mitigating certain types of structures, such as bridges, engineering drawings or blueprints for the structure may be required in addition to the above documentation.
- f. At least two sets of final documentation must be prepared, one for deposit at SHPO archives and a second for placement in a publicly assessable archive near the historic site recorded. The second site will be determined during consultation to use this measure.

B. Tribal Treatment Plan

FEMA shall work with participating Tribe(s) to develop a plan for the protection and treatment of, including but not limited to, Native American human remains, funerary objects, cultural and religious landscapes, ceremonial items, traditional gathering areas and cultural items, for known sites and in the event that any are discovered in conjunction with the Undertaking, including archaeological studies, excavation, geotechnical investigations, grading, and all ground-disturbing activity. The plan shall also formalize procedures for Tribal monitoring during archaeological studies, grading, and ground disturbing activities for the Undertaking.

C. Public Interpretation

Prior to project implementation, FEMA, the Grantee(s), and subgrantee shall work with the SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s) to design an educational interpretive plan. The plan may include signs, displays, educational pamphlets, websites, workshops and other similar mechanisms to educate the public on historic properties within the local

community, state, or region. Once an interpretive plan has been agreed to by the parties, SHPO and/or participating Tribes, and the designated responsible party shall continue to consult throughout implementation of the plan until all agreed upon actions have been completed by the designated responsible party.

D. Historical Context Statements and Narratives

Prior to project implementation, FEMA, the Grantee(s), and subgrantee shall work with the SHPO and participating Tribe(s) to determine the topic and framework of a historic context statement or narrative the designated responsible party shall be responsible for completing. The statement or narrative may focus on an individual property, a historic district, a set of related properties, or relevant themes as identified in the statewide preservation plan. Once the topic of the historic context statement or narrative has been agreed to, the designated responsible party shall continue to coordinate with the SHPO and participating Tribe(s) through the drafting of the document and delivery of a final product. The designated responsible party shall use staff or contractors that meet the Secretary's Professional Qualifications for the appropriate discipline.

E. Oral History Documentation

Prior to project implementation, FEMA, the Grantee(s), and subgrantee shall work with the SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s) to identify oral history documentation needs and agree upon a topic and list of interview candidates. Once the parameters of the oral history project have been agreed upon, the designated responsible party shall continue to coordinate with the SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s) through the data collection, drafting of the document, and delivery of a final product. The designated responsible party shall use staff or contractors that meet the Secretary's Professional Qualifications for the appropriate discipline.

F. Historic Property Inventory

Prior to project implementation, FEMA, the Grantee(s), and subgrantee shall work with the SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s) to establish the appropriate level of effort to accomplish a historic property inventory. Efforts may be directed toward the resurvey of previously designated historic properties and/or districts which have undergone change or lack sufficient documentation, or the survey of new historic properties and/or districts that lack formal designation. Once the boundaries of the survey area have been agreed upon, the designated responsible party shall continue to coordinate with the SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s), through the data collection process. The designated responsible party shall use SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s) forms as appropriate. The designated responsible party shall prepare a draft inventory report, according to SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s) templates and guidelines, and work with the SHPO and/or participating Tribes, until a final property inventory is approved. The designated responsible party shall use staff or contractors that meet the Secretary's Professional Qualifications for the appropriate discipline.

G. National Register and National Historic Landmark Nominations

Prior to project implementation, FEMA, the Grantee(s), and subgrantee shall work with the SHPO and/or participating Tribes to identify the individual properties that would benefit from a completed National Register or National Historic Landmark nomination form. Once the parties have agreed to a property, the designated responsible party shall continue to coordinate with the SHPO and/or participating Tribes, through the drafting of the nomination form. The SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s) shall provide adequate guidance to the designated responsible party during the preparation of the nomination form and shall formally submit the final nomination to the Keeper for inclusion in the National Register. The designated responsible party shall use staff or contractors that meet the Secretary's Professional Qualifications for the appropriate discipline.

H. Geo-References of Historic Maps and Aerial Photographs

Prior to project implementation, FEMA, the Grantee(s), and subgrantee shall work with the SHPO and/or participating Tribe(s) to identify the historic maps and/or aerial photographs for scanning and geo-referencing. Once a list of maps and/or aerial photographs have been agreed upon, the designated responsible party shall continue to coordinate with the SHPO and/or participating Tribes through the scanning and geo-referencing process and shall submit drafts of paper maps and electronic files to the SHPO, and/or participating Tribe(s) for review.. The final deliverable shall include a paper copy of each scanned image, a geo-referenced copy of each scanned image, and the metadata relating to both the original creation of the paper maps and the digitization process.




Attachment 11 Wetlands Protection

This proposed project provides disaster assistance to substantially restore privately-owned, single-family residences as they existed prior to the January 2023 Tornadoes. The State of Georgia CDBG-DR HRRP through U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funding will assist the applicant with housing repair/rehabilitation, replacement, reconstruction, and elevation as required. The proposed project activities are located on the same residential parcel and do not increase the number of housing units that existed prior to the disaster. The proposed project activities are not expected to generate excessive noise during the short-term construction work or long-term operation. Short-term construction noise will be limited to daytime hours. Construction equipment will be required to meet local sound control requirements.

The Noise Control Act of 1972 established a national policy to protect the public from negative health and welfare effects resulting from noise pollution in the environment. It is HUD's "general policy to provide minimum national standards applicable to HUD programs to protect citizens against excessive noise in their communities and places of residence" (24 CFR 51.101[a]). According to 24 CFR 51.101(a)(3), this policy "does not apply to...any action or emergency assistance under disaster assistance provisions or appropriations which are provided to save lives, protect property, protect public health and safety, remove debris and wreckage, or assistance that has the effect of restoring facilities substantially as they existed prior to the disaster." Thus, this proposed CDBG-DR funded activity is in compliance with 24 CFR Part 51, Subpart B and further review is not required under the Noise Abatement and Control section.

This Memorandum is to remain in the Environmental Review Record as part of the project's Tier 1 Broad-Level Environmental Review.
